

The lightness of this South African telescope is remarkable, while at the same time every part is strong and durable. The force necessary to move the instrument by means of the hand-wheel is seven inches. The motions are also communicated to the eye-end and it takes only a force of about two ounces to clamp and remove the telescope either in right ascension or declination.

BEAUTIFUL CITY A HEAP OF RUINS

Awful Fate of Krushovo, in European Turkey.

MONASTIR, European Turkey, Aug. 25.—The once beautiful city of Krushovo is a heap of ruins. The women and children are homeless, exposed to the weather and famine. The town is rendered uninhabitable by the odor of corpses which are being gnawed by dogs and pigs. The Turkish authorities refusing to allow them to be removed under the pretext that an inquest will be held.

FEW ESCAPED.

Three Bulgarian Villages Destroyed By Turks.

Sofia, Bulgaria, Aug. 25.—A revolutionary band has appeared at the village of Teherchok, between Adrianople and Constantinople, within six hours of the sultan's capital. The insurgents and Turks fought and afterwards the Circassian inhabitants of the village pillaged and destroyed three Bulgarian villages in the neighborhood, killing all the men, women and children except a few, who escaped to the mountains.

Attacked by Circassians. Constantinople, Aug. 25.—Three Bulgarian villages near Teherchok, village of the sultan, are reported to have been attacked by Circassians and their units massacred.

Turkish Consul Stopped. Philadelphia, Aug. 25.—The Turkish consul, accompanied by a suite, was stopped by a detachment of the Philadelphia police on Constantinople. They were stopped by a policeman, who demanded their passports. An altercation ensued, and the consul took his companion to the consulate.

Commander Recalled. Constantinople, Aug. 25.—Rushdi Pasha, the commander of the Turkish forces in Macedonia, has been recalled and arrived here yesterday. Marshal of Seres, has been appointed to succeed him.

MONTANA FORESTS BURNING.

Several Large Fires Going in Western Section.

Butte, Aug. 21.—Forest fires are reported from several sections in Montana. Northwest of Anaconda, near the Blue-Eyed Nellie mine, the largest fire in the memory of the earliest settlers is raging, and unless the wind shifts thousands of dollars worth of fine pine timber is doomed.

CHINA SEEKS HELP.

Tokio, Aug. 14 (via Victoria, B. C., Aug. 25).—China in her embarrassment has turned to President Roosevelt, says the Peking correspondent. Nishi Nishi, who says the Chinese emperor was to personally telegraph to President Roosevelt asking the United States that China's former status be revived by means of a loan.

REBELS GAINING STRENGTH.

Russia Has Again Been Asked to Interfere.

Sofia, Aug. 25.—Following the departure of the Russian squadron from Inalza the insurgents attacked and captured a fort there. The bands are especially active around Losengrad, where a number of villages have been burned. Revolutionists at Mahla attacked 250 Bash-Bazouka, who entrenched themselves in a stone tower.
