There was once a young man named Conrad who married a girl named Joan. They were vassals on the estate of a baron who owned and ruled over a great territory.

ORDER OF PUBLICATION Whereas, Mabelle B. Glaser of Vergennes in said County of Addison has filed her libel in the County Court within and for said Addison County, therein setting forth in substance that on the 28th day of May, 1916, said Mabelle B. Glaser was lawfully married to George E. Glaser of Buffalo, N. Y., that her maiden name was Mabelle B. Bristol; that after said marriage the said parties lived together as husband and wife at said Vergennes from about the 10th day of September, 1914, until about the 15th day of April, 1916, and that she herself has resided in said Vergennes since the 15th day of August, 1913; that there have been born of said marriage four children all of whom are still living and all of whom are now minors. Said libel further sets forth that the libellant, on her part, during said marriage coverture, has faithfully kept the marriage covenant and performed all the duties appertaining thereto, but that said George E. Glaser has not kept the marriage covenant, but has violated the same; for that said George E. Glaser has committed adultery, and praying that she may be granted a bill of divorce for the cause aforesaid and that she may be given the care and custody of said minor children.

And it appearing by the affidavit of said libellant that the said George E. Glaser now resides outside the State of Vermont and in parts unknown to said libellant and that, although she has made diligent inquiry, she has been unable to ascertain his present whereabouts, therefore, It is ordered that the said George E. Glaser be summoned to appear and answer the foregoing libel at the next stated term of said County Court to be held at Middlebury within and for said Addison County on the first Tuesday of December, A. D. 1916, by the publication of the substance of said libel together with this order, in the Middlebury Register, a public newspaper, published at said Middlebury, three weeks successively, the last of which publications to be at least six weeks prior to the above mentioned term of said Court.
