Miss Ada Pierce, a teacher in Sudbury, is spending her vacation with her parents.



LEGISLATIVE NOTES.

Two Rutland county members took an Addison county member to church on Sunday and their contribution to the collection plate is described by Herb Moore as follows: "Jim anted, Miller he straddled and Russ opened it for 25 cents. Then the minister took the pot."

The following bills were introduced by Senator Foote of Addison; relating to the erection of a memorial to Commodore Thomas Macdonough; commission to render account to auditor within 60 days after the completion of monument, a full report to be submitted to 1919 Legislature; general committee.

S. 125, reported by Mr. Foote from the judiciary committee; relating to contracts for labor; a person who enters into an agreement to labor for another and in consideration receives any advance of goods, money or transportation and without cause fails to enter into said employment and to labor for a sufficient length of time to reimburse his employer for advances and fails to pay his employer, shall be imprisoned not more than 30 days or fined not more than \$10.

The present week is apt to spell the fate of the board-of-control bill which is now in the judiciary committee. The measure in its present form is almost certain to be reported unfavorably, and administration leaders are now talking of amending the bill. Some of the opponents of the same, say, however, that the only amendment they will consider is to strike out all after the enacting clause and substitute a measure to make the Governor, the purchasing agent and the director of State institutions a governing board so far as the State prison, House of Correction, State hospital, Brandon home, Vergennes school, State house and the purchase of all supplies thereof goes. This would leave the educational and highway departments and the department of justice exactly where they are today.

RURAL CARRIER EXAMINATION.

The United States Civil Service commission has announced an examination for the county of Addison, Vermont, to be held at Middlebury and Vergennes, on April 14, 1917, to fill the position of rural carrier at North Ferrisburg, and vacancies that may later occur on rural routes from other post offices in the above-mentioned county. The examination will be open only to male citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of a post office in the county and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form No. 1977. This form and application blanks may be obtained from the offices mentioned above or from the United States Civil Service commission at Washington, D. C. Application should be forwarded to the Commission at Washington at the earliest practicable date.
