Yesterday we had worse luck in Lincoln, Starksboro and Monkton, but that was because there were few young men to be found. Every body was out in the fields hoeing potatoes. Tomorrow we plan another tour through Bridport, Orwell and other towns.

"Most of the men realize it is better for them to enlist now than to wait for the draft, for with us they will get more pay than with the regulars and will go to France with their home regiment rather than be scattered among strangers. The First Vermont is the only fighting unit that will see service in France, and any Vermonter within the age limit ought to be proud of the chance to enlist in this regiment. The regiment did fine work on the Mexican border last summer. It was known to be one of the finest in the service and outkicked one of the infantry regiments of the regular army. We have the best officers and men that can be found anywhere. A soldier's life is full of excitement. We are well fed and enjoy the best of health and in the first Vermont we are in a regiment that has no equal in the world."
