A Poem for Today

ADDRESS TO A MUMMY

By Horace Smith

HORACE SMITH, poet and novelist, was born in London in 1779 and died there in 1848. In collaboration with his brother a large number of parodies and imitations that were considered great by the critics of their time. The best known of these were the "30 Jokes for Advertisers" which were supposed to be poems to celebrate the opening of a new playhouse, entered in a competition by the best London writers of the day. The verses given below are generally thought to be Smith's best work.

AND thou hast walked about (how strange a story!)
In "Thebes" streets three thousand years ago,
When the Memorandum was in all its glory,
And time had not begun to overgrow
Those temples, palaces, and piles stupendous,
Of which the very ruins are tremendous.

Speak! for thou long enough hast acted dummy;
Thou hast a tongue—come, let us hear its tone;
Thou'rt standing on thy legs, above ground, mummy!
Revisiting the glimpses of the moon
Not like thin ghosts or disembodied creatures,
But with thy bones and flesh and limbs and features.

Perhaps that very hand, now pinioned flat,
Has hob-nobbed with Pharaoh, glass to glass;
Or dropped a half-penny in Homer's hat;
Or doffed thine own to let Queen Dido pass,
Or held, by Solomon's own invitation,
A torch, at the great Temple's dedication.

Thou couldst develop—if that withered tongue
Might tell us what those sightless orbs have seen—
How the world looked when it was fresh and young,
And the great deluge still had left it green;
Or was it then so old that history's pages
Contained no record of its early ages?

Still silent! Incommunicative elf!
Art sworn to secrecy? then keep thy vows;
But prithee tell us something of thyself,
Reveal the secrets of thy prison house;
Since in the world of spirits thou hast slumbered,
What hast thou seen, what strange adventures numbered?

If the tomb's secrets may not be confessed,
The nature of thy private life unfold:
A heart has throbbled beneath that leathern breast,
And tears adown that dusty cheek have rolled;
Have children climbed those knees and kissed that face?
What was thy name and station, age and race?

Statue of flesh—immortal of the dead!
Imperishable type of evanescence!
Posthumous man, who quitted thy narrow bed,
And standest undecayed within our presence!
Thou wilt hear nothing till the Judgment morning,
When the great trump shall thrill thee with its warning.

Why should this worthless tegument endure,
If its undying guest be lost forever?
Oh, let us keep the soul embalmed and pure
In living virtue, that when both must sever,
Although corruption may our frame consume,
The immortal spirit in the skies may bloom!
