MILLIONAIRES ON EAST COAST

Passing Through Here Daily Bound For Palm Beach and South—Many Travelers Arriving.

The month of January will see many luxurious private cars pass along the Florida East Coast Railway. A number of the leading millionaires of the country will winter on the American Riviera.

Mr. Oliver's private car, "Tyrona," was delivered to the Florida East Coast Railway on Wednesday last and with Mr. Oliver and party proceeded to Palm Beach, where they will spend the season.

Mr. George W. Crawford and party, en route to Palm Beach, delivered their private car, "Starlight," to the Florida East Coast Railway on January 19.

Mr. Howard Gould's private car, "Twilight," was delivered to the railroad Sunday and has arrived at Ormond with Mr. Gould and party.

Mr. Alfred Vanderbilt and party, in the former's private car, "Edgemere," are at Ormond.

Mr. C. M. Schwab and party, in Mr. Schwab's private car, "Loretta," are at Ormond.

A. C. Frick, with a party of friends, will pass through here about January 27, in the former's private car "Olympia," en route to Palm Beach.

The private car "Rover," with W. P. Snyder and party aboard, will be delivered to the Florida East Coast Railway on the 27th and will go to Palm Beach.

A Canadian Pacific car, the "Athabasca," is at the depot with D. D. Mann, president of the Canadian Pacific railroad aboard.

Mr. Mann is accompanied by his wife, son and sister-in-law, Miss Williams. The party are making a tour of Florida and will, after viewing the races, proceed to Palm Beach.

Stanley in St. Augustine.

Louis S. Ross, who accompanied Newton Stanley to the hospital at St. Augustine, received a telegram from Dr. S. G. Worley stating that his patient is threatened with appendicitis, and asking permission to perform an operation.

Mr. Ross says that Mr. Stanley gave him a description of the Croker accident. He denies the report that his motorcycle was broken, and asserts that he was on the beach near the surf, with the water on his right. He heard a whirl and found he was on the ground. He turned off the power to his machine and when he started to rise found, for the first time, that his left leg was broken. The left pedal of his machine was also broken, indicating that the Croker machine struck him on the left side, both machines going in the same direction.

Mr. Croker did not make a statement, but eye-witnesses are of the opinion that the dead man lost control of his car some time before it struck Mr. Stanley, and that his being in the course of the runaway machine was only an incident to the accident.

State Items.

A Methodist church will soon be erected in Springfield, one of Jacksonville's growing suburbs.

Geo. M. Stockinger, turnkey at the Pensacola police station, was killed in Pensacola Wednesday by falling in front of a street car.

A subscription paper is being actively circulated in DeLand and Daytona for the construction of a pine straw road between these two Volusia county towns.

Rumors are afloat that a fine new hotel is soon to be built by the Florida East Coast Railway Company at Homestead, the present terminus of the road.

The sentence of imprisonment for life has been imposed on James E. Starke for the killing of his brother-in-law, John F. Angel, in the Southern Express office in Jacksonville last September.

The Depraved Camel.

Trout That Are Not Trout.

Dr. Theodore Gill of the Smithsonian institution in calling attention to the misnaming of our native fish by early settlers instanced among others the trout. The pilgrims, finding in New England streams a fish that reminded them of the trout of England, gave it the same name, although Isaac Walton would have told them that it was not a trout, but a char. In Maine landlocked salmon and in certain lakes another salmonid fish were also called trout. In the south the name trout was given to black bass. In California a peculiar fish was named trout, apparently for no other reason than its possession of spots. The Gila river trout is not a trout at all.
