## HAWLEY BROKE 10 MILE RECORD.

Driving the E. R. Thomas 90 h. p. Mercedes, Hawley Covers the 10 Miles in 6:31.4-5 Seconds. Previous Record was 6:50

### NO RACES WERE RUN IN THE AFTERNOON

The races yesterday morning were started at the Club House and run south, that being the best part of the beach. The day was much warmer and a larger number of people were out to see the result.

The first race was event No. 12, between Wm. Wallace, in his 90 h p F I A T, and Paul Sartori, driving Alfred G. Vanderbilt's 90 h p F I A T. Wallace won easily in 9:51 2-5. Sartori being badly beaten. Last year, Vanderbilt drove his machine ten miles in 6:50.

The second race was event No. 11, ten miles for Mercedes cars only, in which B. M. Shanley's 90 h p car, driven by Frederick's, Jas. L. Breese in a 35 h p, S. B. Stevens in a 90 h p car, and E. R. Thomas, 90 h p, competed.

The Thomas car, driven by Ed. Hawley, covered the 10 miles in 6:31 4-5, breaking the world's record made here last year in 6:50 flat, by W. K. Vanderbilt in a 90 h. p. Mercedes.

Shanley finished second, in 7:44 1-5, Breese third. Stevens broke down and did not finish.

The third race, the Ormond Derby for the Maj. C. J. S. Miller trophy, was run in three heats, the first being between Arthur E. MacDonald in his 90 h p Napier, Jos. H. Heller in an 80 h p Pipe, and M. G. Bernin in W. G. Brokaw's 60 h p Renault.

MacDonald finished first in 7:00, the Pipe second, 7:40 2-5 and the Renault third in 7:58. The second heat was between E. R. Thomas' 90 h p Daimler and B. M. Shanley's 90 h p Daimler, which proved of little interest, as the cars finished so far apart.

The Thomas car finished in 7:10,

Shanley's time being 10:29 4-5. The third heat was between Jas. L. Breese's 35 h p Daimler and Wm. Wallace's 90 h p F I A T. In this heat Wallace did not finish.

The Daimler finished in 10:29 2-5. This ended the races for the morning, the beach being so wet and soft that fast time could be made only at much risk to the drivers.

Owing to the condition of the beach, and the tide not being low until late, no races were run in the afternoon.

#### Parade Today.

Weather permitting, the automobile parade will no doubt attract a large crowd of sightseers to witness this interesting event.

The autos will assemble at Hotel Ormond at 10:30 this morning and drive down the beach to this city, visiting the Club House, where pictures will be taken, thence parading Ridgewood avenue and continuing via the river road to Ormond. All car owners are requested to participate.

#### M. E. Conference.

At 9 o'clock Friday morning the Bishop took the chair and took up the routine business of the conference. Reports from the pastors of Eustis district were continued. All show a good work done during the year and have a hopeful future.

Dr. L. S. Rader then reported the Jacksonville district and the pastors followed in more detailed reports. This district is stretched along the coast from Jacksonville to Miami and has much in social and religious conditions which the pastors and people are meeting that is different from the other parts of the State, but the church at each place is keeping pace with the demands, and the church is making rapid progress along all lines.

For this success no little amount of credit is due to the many loyal and true Methodists who spend the winters in Florida but have homes in the North. Rev. Dr. Handin, of Kinsey, Ala., was introduced and told of his work in the seminary there, of which he is president. He asked the conference to buy a scholarship in that school for girls, and in a few minutes \$170 was given to hold this scholarship for the St. Johns River Conference, the interest on which will pay for the schooling of a girl. A great deal of enthusiasm was aroused in this effort to secure money for this school which is struggling hard to afford opportunity for the education of the poor whites in Alabama. The president and his wife are old people, who are doing a heroic work at great sacrifice.

The afternoon was given up to evangelistic services, with an excellent sermon by Rev. G. E. Farrar, of Winter Park. A special attraction at all these services is the singing by Evangelist Harris and his wife. The Bishop also delights every one in the singing of soul stirring songs, sung as only he himself can sing them.

Dr. W. P. Thirkfield, of Cincinnati, held the audience last night in his intensely interesting subject: "Anglo-Saxon Civilization and the World for Christ."

The program for yesterday was: Conference business from 9 to 11:45 a. m., sermon at 2:30 p. m. by Rev. Addyman Smith, of DeLand. At night the Epworth League anniversary held with an address by some one who was not named in the announcements.

Dr. F. M. Kemper, of Jacksonville, was excused from further attendance on conference and returned home Friday afternoon in order that he might be in the great revival now being held there under the leadership of Dr. Munnhall, an evangelist of national fame.

The program for Sunday services is a follows: At the First M. E. Church, preaching by Rev. H. S. White at 11 a. m. Evangelistic services conducted at 7 p. m. by Miss Cartright, an evangelist of note from Cincinnati, O.

At the First Baptist Church at 11 a. m., sermon by Rev. G. Henry Martin; at 7 p. m., G. E. Farrar.

At Kingston M. E. Church, 11 a. m., sermon by Rev. H. L. Townsend; at 7 p. m., Rev. H. G. Porter. These

appointments are subject to possible change, but not so as to disappoint any who may attend any of the services, as equally good men who might be substituted will be sent. It is possible that the appointments will be read by the Bishop tonight after the service in Seabreeze avenue church.
