Prominent North Carolinian Here.

Mrs. Chas. A. Webb and children who are stopping at Mrs. Bereman's, 227 S. Ridgewood, were delighted by the unexpected arrival last Sunday of the husband and father, Senator Chas. A. Webb, of Asheville, N. C., who will spend a few days recuperating in Daytona's salubrious climate, when he expects to return to his native city to take active part in the campaign for the establishment of the public dispensary in place of the open saloon.

Senator Webb is the sponsor of this movement in North Carolina and opened the campaign in Asheville, on Friday night last, in a speech in which he showed the advantages of state control by the dispensary system over the vicious tendencies of the open saloon, or the demoralizing influence of the "joint" and the "blind tiger," where prohibition has been attempted.

Hon. Robert W. Davis.

After serving in Congressional capacity for four terms, Hon. Robert W. Davis of this city, on last Saturday, again returned to private life. For this reason the adjournment of Congress was an event of more than passing interest, not only to the people of the Second Congressional district, but of the State as well.

Mr. Davis has represented his constituency in fact as in name, and his retirement from the National forum is a source of keen regret to his many loyal admirers. Mr. Davis never posed as a speaker, and it was but seldom that his voice was heard in advocacy of or in opposition to a measure, yet he was recognized as a leading figure on the Democratic side, for when he did speak it was to the point, and his utterances never failed to carry weight. It was his idea that a Congressman should "talk less and work more."

How well he succeeded by pursuing this policy has perhaps been best attested by the general success that has attended his efforts. During his eight years of service Florida's delegation succeeded in securing appropriations of millions of dollars for river and harbor improvements, for government sites, buildings, etc. In this hardworking delegation Judge Davis was a potent factor, and to his labors is in part due these excellent results. But why go into the details of his course in the House? It has been too successful, too brilliant, to be soon forgotten by the people whom he has so faithfully, so conscientiously served. Mr. Davis has made a record for himself, to which he may well point with a feeling of pride, and one which has seldom been equaled in the annals of this district. He returns to the practice of law richer in experience and ability, and will again take his place as a leader of the Florida bar.

Hon. Frank Clark, who succeeds Mr. Davis, is well qualified to fill the seat vacated. He is a diligent worker, a brilliant speaker, and a man of unusual natural ability. We bespeak for him a career equally as successful as that of his colleagues—Messrs. Lamar and Sparkman.—Palatka Times Herald.
