CHRISTIAN UNITY COMMISSION MEETS IN LONDON.

LONDON, Dec. 21—A conference of the International Commission on Christian Unity, at which the American branch was represented by Dr. Elias McBee, editor of the Churchman, was opened in London today. The commission hopes to bring a greater degree of friendship and a closer co-operation between all denominations and phases of religious work. A report on this subject will be prepared and will be submitted to the World's Missionary Conference at its meeting next June. Sir Andrew Fraser, ex-governor of Bengal, presided at today's session, and Mr. McBee acted as vice-chairman.

CHRISTMAS SERVICES AT THE CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH.

A large congregation assembled at the First Congregational church, Sunday morning to enjoy Christmas services. The music was exceptionally good, the solo by Mrs. Ensley was specially well rendered.

Dr. Marsh took for the morning lesson, 9 v., 2 chap. of Matthew; "Where is he that was born king of the Jews for we have seen His star in the East and have come to worship Him."

The speaker had something to say first concerning those wise men of the east. They were princes of royal power, who had devoted their lives to the study of astrology. They had taken up the study of the stars not for utility or profit as men study medicine or mathematics, and their spiritual insight was quickened by living close to the infinite, the eternal, the immutable. They made the mistake, however, of reasoning from the material plane in thinking that the new king would be in the household of Herod, the King of the Jews, and in following this carnal mind they lost their star. They looked first to Jerusalem instead of Bethlehem where the star pointed them. The speaker drew a lesson from this. Stars are God's messengers, he said, for God speaks not in vocals but in things, and his speech is perfection. The speaker drew the picture of the wise men when they found the babe and worshipped at its feet with rare gifts.

Was it faith or knowledge that made them recognize Jesus? It was both.

Have we learned the story of love and trust? It was a child that the Magi found. We are all near God when we see a little child in faith and trust. The question this morning is, Does the Christmas time bring each of us grow in the direction we travel. We grow in the direction we travel. We are God's endowment of his power, and receive from him his gifts of peace. Let us pray for the star to guide us and lead us to higher spiritual heights.
