TEACHERS' EXAMINATION. The regular examination of applicants for teachers' certificates will be held on Friday and Saturday, July 1 and 2, 1898. In certificating candidates, the matter of faithful attendance and work on the part of teachers at the Institute will be observed.

It has been thought best to defer arranging a program till the beginning of the Institute. The classification will be arranged to suit the "Course of Study" which has undergone a complete revision and amplification. By this means of procedure, teachers will be enabled to pursue such work as they want, with more profit to themselves, than by the course heretofore outlined. Classes will be organized in the common branches, including Bookkeeping and Natural Philosophy.

LECTURES AND ENTERTAINMENTS.

President Boyd, of the University of Oklahoma, will deliver a lecture at Beaver sometime during the Institute. The date will be announced later. Teachers should not fail to hear this lecture. Arrangements will be made for one or two other lectures. There will also be one musical and literary entertainment, and there will, it is expected, be an elocutionary contest during the session.

Having provided for a high grade of instruction for its coming session, the Institute directly appeals to you for your presence and help in making the work profitable. Possibly, without having given the matter careful consideration, you may think you cannot afford to come. This is a mistake. You cannot afford not to attend; that is, if you expect to teach. Time spent here is not time lost. Should your salary be small, by work and perseverance increase it. Your coming to the Institute, brushing up the mind in contact with other bright and ambitious minds, gaining new ideas and renewed energy, would, in such a case, be the best thing you could do, for the assistance would greatly repay you for the time and money spent. Whether you are a prospective teacher looking with interest to your prospective work, or whether, fitted for teaching by pature, training and experience, you are for pedagogical reasons as duly related to the Institute as to the school and should come and do what good you can.
