LINE THROUGH.

The Beaver and Liberal Telephone Line Completed

Although the Beaver and Liberal telephone line has been built for several days, there have been but few messages sent over the line. From reports it appears that the Liberal people had not decided where they should place the telephone at that end of the wire. Word was received yesterday afternoon that the telephone had temporarily been placed in the Rock Island hotel, but the news from there has been meager.

The line connects with the John George ranch and for several days the Beaver people have been talking with those at the ranch. Shortly after Mr. Mead returned to Liberal it was expected that communication could be had with Liberal at once. Word came from the ranch Monday that Mr. Mead, who had gone to Liberal to place the telephone had returned to the ranch and found something wrong with the wire between there and Liberal. That, it is reported, was the cause of the delay in hearing from Liberal.

In the meantime the wire from here to the ranch has been used freely. The boys at the ranch can certainly have no objections to the entertainment given them by the people at the Beaver Hotel. In turn the people at this end of the line have likewise been entertained by those at the ranch.
