### Fixing for Alfalfa.

It's time now to be getting that land ready that you're going to sow to alfalfa this fall. Within the next month the sooner the better, plow it from eight to twelve inches deep and harrow each half day's plowing before leaving the field. Disk or harrow at least once each week until late in August or in September. Then whenever the soil is full of moisture, sow from fifteen to twenty pounds of the best alfalfa seed to acre. Broadcast it or drill it in as you prefer, but do a good job.

This sort of treatment will kill a lot of weeds and grass. It will firm the seed bed so that the alfalfa roots do not have to bridge a lot of air spaces as they go down in the search of moisture. The sun, rains and air will unlock some fertility that the little alfalfa plants need. They are tender little things when they start and need your help. But you can't give it to them after they have started. You must give it by having made their bed in proper style beforehand.

Begin locating that alfalfa seed right now. Get it from a neighbor if you can. If not get it from the nearest available point. Buy a sample. Send the sample to the Experiment Station, Stillwater, Okla., and get it tested free. Then order the seed, so many bushels, "as per sample." When it comes send a fair sample of it to the station and have it tested again. If it falls far short of the first sample, you have cause for action. And if you can't recover from the seller of the seed, you can prevent the loss which will be yours if you get bad weeds like dodder started or get too thin a stand from sowing poor seed.

And if it gets dry, keep working the soil and save the seed. It is too big a gamble to put three dollars worth of alfalfa seed into each acre of dry soil and expect the rain to come. Better wait till next spring before sowing if that happens.—Oklahoma Farm Journal

"When I went to Oklahoma," said H. E. Putman of Hardesty, O. T., yesterday, "no farming was carried on, and no one ever supposed any farming would ever be done there. The whole country was full of cattle. Herds were scattered all over the open prairies, and that was about all there was to be seen. But now we are farming. We are raising wheat, corn and all kinds of forage feeds, and a good many hogs. Wheat harvest will start this week. A few weeks ago we thought there would be no wheat, but it has kept on growing and now there is a show for a fair sized crop. We are raising forage in large quantities, which insures plenty of feed for our stock in winter. Hog raising is also increasing, and we find hogs very

profitable; the raising costs but little. The acreage of corn is the largest we have ever had.—K. C. Drover's Telegram.

### May Hold Election.

The supreme court of Oklahoma, is dissolving the injunction restraining the authorities from holding an election on the proposed constitution, will doubtless be commended by a majority of lawyers in the country. The fact, however, that two of the seven supreme court judges gave dissenting opinions shows that the legal questions involved were somewhat intricate.

Woods county was divided and made three counties by the constitutional convention. A citizen of that county secured an injunction restraining the holding of an election on the constitution while it provided for a division of that county. The injunction in Woods county was granted by the judge of the probate court in the absence of the district judge, but when the matter was brought before the judge of the district court he refused to dissolve the injunction.

What the court really held, stripped of legal phraseology, was that the constitutional convention possessed the power to legislate and fix the county lines of the proposed new state, and that in its work of forming a new state there was no power in Oklahoma above the constitutional convention. Its only limitation is to form a state that is republican in form and that the first power to pass on the question as to whether the government of the new state is republican in form will be the President of the United States at the time of the admission into the Union.

The great common people not only in Oklahoma but in other sections of the country who are not posted on the technicalities of the law will indorse the decision because they will feel that after the people had selected delegates to the constitutional convention, and they had completed their work, the people themselves had the right to approve or reject the proposed constitution. If the decision had been different there would always have been the complaint that the courts had defeated the will of the people. It therefore seems that the action of the court is sustained by both law and policy.—Wichita Eagle.
