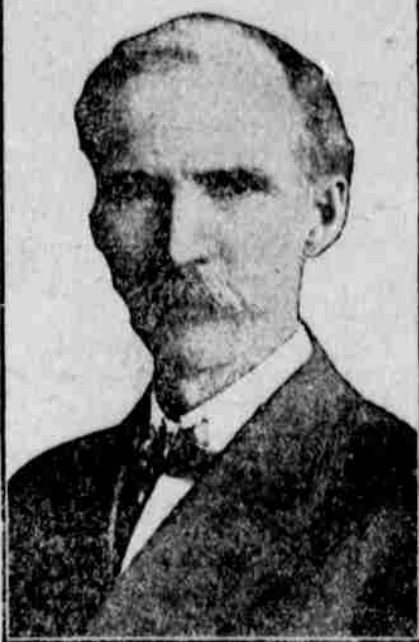

Hon. Dick T. Morgan, candidate for Congress from this District, addressed the citizens of Beaver and vicinity at the court house Thursday afternoon upon the leading issues of the campaign. We are sorry that all the voters could not be present to hear Mr. Morgan. His talk was not long but was to the point, and showed up many of the false accusations of the opposition in a different light.

His record in Congress is one which might well be envied by any statesman, and exceeded by very few, and yet this was his first term. If he can accomplish so much the first term, what might we expect of the second? It is gratifying to the people of the Second District to know that their Representative in Congress did not miss a single roll call during the entire session, and his vote was recorded either aye or nay at every vote taken. Mr. Morgan has done much in the way of securing needed legislative appropriations and favors for his constituents, and it is hardly likely that they will so far forget their best interests as to fail to return Mr. Morgan to Congress by a bigger majority than ever.
