MR. J. A. GRAHAM, Commercial Secretary:

DEAR SIR:—I came here last November from Centralia, Washington, and bought 19 1-4 acres of land.

I paid one-third down, and moved in on a one-room house, and planted seven and one-half acres of cabbage, on which I cleared \$1,700.

I had a small planting of beans and tomatoes, a total of 9 acres including the cabbage, and cleared \$2,400 on the whole crop.

I worked four years in the State of Washington for \$75 per month, and I have made and saved more here this past year than the four years I was in Washington.

I will have 30 acres in cabbage this winter—I forgot to say that I bought 19 acres more and have built me a good residence. I had to pay more for this 19 acres than I did for the land I bought last year. I think the climate the best I ever saw, and my family's health and my own has been perfect. There is no malaria, fever or grippe here. I expect to plant an orange grove next season, as oranges, lemons, grapes, figs, and all berries do well here.
