Big Irrigation Plan Indorsed.

"The application of the Bell & White Irrigation Company for extensive water rights in Cimarron county, by which a portion of the waters of Cimarron river are to be used in reclaiming more than 120,000 acres of arid and semi-arid land, has been granted by Secretary Ben F. Henney of the state board of agriculture.

According to the figures submitted by Mr. Bell, the capacity of the reservoir will exceed seven billion cubic feet of water, which if spread out over a level surface would cover 180,000 acres to the depth of one foot. The dam will be 128 feet high and almost as wide as a small mountain at the bottom, and the cost of it together with the cost of canals, etc., will exceed \$2,500,000. The main canal will be over 100 miles long with its eastern end in the vicinity of Ralley.—Oklahoman.
