Two Cent Fares in Oklahoma.

For the next six months, at least, railroad passenger charges in Oklahoma on the larger railroad systems will be only two cents per mile. This is the result of an agreement reached in Oklahoma City Friday afternoon by Attorney General West, representing the corporation commission, and the state of Oklahoma, and the attorneys for the railroads.

A stipulation was entered into that pending final settlement of the Oklahoma rate case in the supreme court of the United States, sometime after January 1, 1914, the railroads will charge only the fare allowed by the Oklahoma constitution, from the enforcement of which the state was enjoined by Judge Hook of the federal court in 1910.

The final settlement of the case will be made after the first of the coming year, when the railroads either will dismiss their cases due to the recent decisions of the United States supreme court, or the action will be taken to that court for determination on its merits. The question of rebates on excess charges also will be settled at that time.
