

GREATEST FAIR IN HISTORY OF SOUTHWEST THIS YEAR

Thousands of Dollars Offered in Premiums; Extra Musical Attractions are Booked; Splendid Racing Program Assured For Seventh Annual Exposition.

Officers and directors of the Oklahoma State Fair and Exposition are now selecting many and varied attractions for the greatest show ever contemplated in the Southwest. The seventh annual exhibition will be held at Oklahoma City September 22 to October 4, 1915. No expense will be spared in making it the final word in everything a great exposition should be.

Experience of six years is a great asset in the present management and the preparation, while on a larger scale than ever before, are comparatively easier. Everything is connected with the work of getting ready, therefore, under the direction of Secretary I. S. Mahan, is moving along smoothly.

The 1915 premium list has just been issued. It has been carefully revised and approaches the ideal.

The amount of money offered in premiums this year is considerably in excess of that offered by many other fairs much older in years. The list is more comprehensive than ever before and prizes are offered for the most excellent product in practically every line of industry that flourishes in Oklahoma and the Southwest territory. Some idea of the offerings may be gleaned from the following: Cattle, \$1,000.00; horses, \$1,000.00; sheep, \$1,000.00; swine, \$1,000.00; poultry, \$1,000.00; and so on down the list.

Many Special Premiums.

In addition to the cash premiums offered by the State Fair and Exposition, practically every national breeders association has authorized cash prizes and valuable trophies. Various manufacturers have offered cash premiums and no less than ninety-five boys and girls of their respective counties. These valuable prizes and trophies have been classified in such a way as to bring out the best of everything in Oklahoma. By doing this, the seventh annual State Fair and Exposition will afford the greatest educational advantages to the hundreds of thousands of visitors, no matter what their line of work may be.

Music lovers of Oklahoma will welcome the announcement that Natelli and his band have been engaged to furnish music throughout the fair period. The organization has thirty renowned soloists, many high class singers and a number of splendid specialities. Popular singers, including Olive Egan Schart, a noted soprano, and Joseph C. Rammer, a famous baritone, will be heard in Oklahoma for the first time.

Two big events of the Kansas Oklahoma circuit, the great Southwestern and three-year-old Trotting Futurities, will feature the harness program, and it is proposed to make racing one of the strong attraction features at the fair this fall. The annual meeting will include the fastest trotters and pacers and there will be running events every day. Large purses bring the best horses and the track has been pronounced one of the best in this section of the country.

A horse show program will be arranged for the second week of the State Fair and Exposition for the sole purpose of making it the one big event of the year. No effort in connection with the State Fair and Exposition has received more attention from the directors than the Horse Show and it will open in a blaze of glory on Monday night, Sept. 15 (the second week of the fair) and continue for five nights.

The night show in front of the immense grand stand, the first week of the fair will be an entirely new feature this year. After the thousands of visitors have spent the day in the sixty buildings and barns, studios and learning about everything Oklahoma produces, the management feels that they should be provided with relaxation and recreation. Featuring the night show will be maneuvers of United States soldiers who will hold an encampment throughout the entire period of the State Fair on the State Fair grounds. It will be worth a trip to the fair to see the spectacular drilling and marching of Uncle Sam's best fighting men.

Section Nine, Article Nine.

The many features favoring the amendment to Section Nine, Article Nine of the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma, as put up to the people for amending the Constitution at special election to be held August 5th, next, can be summarized in the following:

1st. It will greatly reduce taxation by increasing the taxable valuation of the domestic railroad mileage in the state and thus aid every taxpayer.

2nd. It will reduce freight rates along all domestic railroad lines by eliminating the two line haul.

3rd. It will promote extension of domestic railroad lines in the state and will make it possible for short connecting lines to be financed and constructed, thus adding greatly to the railroad mileage of the state, to development of its resources, and to the increase of its taxable wealth.

4th. It was not proposed by the railroad interests, but originated with the people, and the fight for its adoption is being made by the people.

5th. In previous elections when Section Nine of Article Nine was submitted to the people for approval the attempt was made to curtail the power of the Corporation Commission and destroy the spirit of the Constitution. The present amendment vitalizes the Constitution and increases the power of the Corporation Commission in its control of corporate wealth and gives additional opportunities for railroad building, and the development of the latest resources of the state.

6th. It was submitted to and approved by Messrs. Henshaw and Watson of the Corporation Commission before acted upon by the legislature.

7th. No consolidation can be made without the approval of the Corporation Commission in writing.

8th. The Legislature may provide additional restrictions for the protection of the public.

These are the conditions upon which the amendment is this time submitted to the voters of the state. Every interest of the people is safely guarded against the encroachments of corporate influence and we believe it would be wise for the people to vote for its adoption.—Morning Times.

Two Cent Fares in Oklahoma.

For the next six months, at least, railroad passenger charges in Oklahoma on the larger railroad systems will be only two cents per mile. This is the result of an agreement reached in Oklahoma City Friday afternoon by Attorney General West, representing the corporation commission, and the state of Oklahoma, and the attorneys for the railroads.

A stipulation was entered into that pending final settlement of the Oklahoma rate case in the supreme court of the United States, sometime after January 1, 1914, the railroads will charge only the fare allowed by the Oklahoma constitution, from the enforcement of which the state was enjoined by Judge Hook of the federal court in 1910.

The final settlement of the case will be made after the first of the coming year, when the railroads either will dismiss their cases due to the recent decisions of the United States supreme court, or the action will be taken to that court for determination on its merits. The question of rebates on excess charges also will be settled at that time.
