With good wa'ks we venture one pair of shoes would last us longer and look better than four pairs now do. The saving on shoes each year would be no inconsiderable item. If you think it does not, why do you brush up and attempt to look your best when going out of town or when expecting to meet friends or husiness associates. We believe it would be to the business interest of the town to have such walks as are so badly needed built and those interested for that matter but having property here, should get together and see what can be done.
