PUBLIC HEALTH WORK WILL BE EMPHASIZED

Medical Counselor With Community Institute Conducts Physical Examinations of Children.

One of the most important features of the Community Institute, which will be held here under the auspices of the extension division of the University of Oklahoma, will be the work of the medical staff, consisting of Dr. Frances P. Wiggins and Miss Nelle B. Turner and Miss Mabel E. Smith, nurses.

During the Institute, Dr. Wiggins will conduct free physical examina-

tions of school children. However, no prescriptions will be given, nor medical work done. When children are found who have physical defects, Dr. Wiggins will consult with parents, and urge that they take the children to local physicians for further examination and treatment.

It has been found that a great number of children have physical defects, which are not apparent, but which may lead to grave danger later in life. Most of these defects can be easily corrected while the child is young.

Acting in an advisory capacity with Dr. Wiggins is Dr. LeRoy Long, dean of the school of medicine of the University of Oklahoma, whom she frequently consults regarding cases that are brought to her attention during the Community Institutes.
