## MEMORIAL SUNDAY AND DECORATION

The observance of Memorial Sunday and Decoration Day in Beaver was attended with unusual interest. A crowd which filled the Christian church to more than capacity, gathered for Memorial exercises Sunday and Evangelist Mathis delivered a splendid discourse. Good music was an added feature. The church was tastefully decorated in the national colors.

On Decoration Day another immense crowd gathered and the program of the day was carried out in a most inspiring and patriotic manner. At 10 o'clock the parade formed and proceeded to the cemetery for the decoration of graves. In the afternoon a literary program was given at the Community Pavilion.

Never before were such gorgeous flowers provided for the decoration of graves and there were quantities of them. The cemetery was a veritable bed of bloom.

The speaker of the day was Attorney Roscoe Ritzley, of Guyton, formerly of Beaver. He spoke in his well-known able manner and paid a beautiful tribute to the soldiers of all wars. W. B. Leonard also spoke and his brief remarks embodied a hope for lasting peace. Special music and singing by the vast crowd concluded the exercises. Old Glory floated from the staff at the top of the pavilion and the interior of the building was lavishly decorated with Red, White and Blue.

Right here we want to say a word of commendation for those who directed the exercises and also for the citizens who so well demonstrated their patriotism by their assistance, their attendance and the displaying of flags at the homes, at their places of business and on their cars in the parade. Such a universal display of our National Emblem is evidence, which speaks louder than words, the underlying feeling of patriotism and reverence for our Nation's Dead. We are glad that Beaver folk so expressed themselves in this quiet, reverent, unostentatious manner.

## BEAVER GIRL WEDS
