FOUR COUNTY COMMISSIONERS To Be Elected by the People and to Receive \$300 Per Year

The following is the bill in full introduced in the senate to provide four county commissioners for Anderson county and showing how the division of the county is to be made:

Section. That in the county of Anderson there shall be four county commissioners as hereinafter provided.

Section 1. That in the county of Anderson is hereby divided into four sections of four townships each, as follows: The townships of Corner, Hall, Savannah and Varennes shall constitute and be known as section number one; the townships of Rock Mills shall constitute and be known as section number two; the townships of Gavitt, Branchy Creek, Williamson and Hopewell shall constitute and be known as section number three; and the townships of Belton, Broadway, Hones Path and Martin shall constitute and be known as section number four.

Section 3. There shall, at the next regular election of 1914, and every two years thereafter, be elected by the people four county commissioners who shall serve two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Section 4. One of the said commissioners shall be a resident of section number one; one a resident of section number two; one a resident of section number three; and one a resident of section number four.

Section 5. The said four commissioners with the county supervisor, as now provided for by law, shall constitute and be known as the county board of commissioners; the supervisor being chairman of the board.

Section 6. In addition to the duties now required by law, by the county commissioners, they shall, by a further duty of each commissioner in his section to look well after the roads of country roads are worked and kept in repair and see that all cross cuts in repair and that all bridges and culverts across the roads are kept in repair and the approaches to bridges roads, to see that the ditches and drains are kept open and all trash or other obstruction removed after rains, to have all holes in roads filled, and not wait for much repairs for the general working of bridges and culverts. In order that this work be done by each commissioner in his section, the board shall provide him the use of such hand or hands as may be necessary to run over his road between general workings. He shall frequently look over all roads and bridges in his section and report to the supervisor the condition and the supervisor shall see that any damage to roads and bridges and reports are repaired at once, by furnishing hands or material to make needed repairs.

Section 7. It is hereby made the further duty of each commissioner in each section to make a list of all persons liable to work on the roads or pay the commutation road tax, and report the same to the board for proper entry for taxation.

Section 8. The salary of each commissioner is hereby fixed at three hundred dollars per year to be paid monthly, as provided for by law.

Section 9. All acts or parts of acts in conflict with this are hereby repealed.
