Atlanta, Feb. 25.—Even in the most serious situations and those most vitally affecting public welfare the element of comedy at time creeps in and yesterday afternoon the wires got crossed on the locker club situation in a way that brought the dry grins to more than one usually serious face.

The grand jury was in final session and the locker club question was taken up. The Men and Religion leaders prepared a magnificent, written editorial for the afternoon papers commending the grand jury for its fearlessness and calling on the public to watch the noble sight of the grand jury swatting the locker clubs as they had swatted the convict camps.

The Men and Religion editorial was thoughtful and well written. It was three columns wide and dominated the inside page where it was printed.
