THE FIRST YEAR OF WOODROW WILSON.

He has not lost the modesty that characterized the plain citizen who was at the head of Princeton University.

He has gained in weight, retained a good appetite, and enjoyed eating the sparseness that marked him a year ago having nearly vanished.

He has not had as much opportunity for exercise or reading newspapers, but indulges in both pleasures as a serious duty as much as possible.

He has "kept up" on current literature, reads best sellers and magazines, and enjoys detective stories, but does not write as much.

He has traveled exactly 9,119 miles on railroad trains since his inauguration, a new low record for presidents since parlor cars came in.

He has shaken hands with 85,000 persons, averaging about 230 a day, and escaped the New Year's reception, with its 10,000 handshakes.

He has received about 160,000 letters on an average of about 500 a day, of which but a small percentage reached his own private desk.

He has attended church as regularly as when head of Princeton or governor of New Jersey, and has greatly improved his game of golf.

He has been able to get more sleep, usually retiring early and never breaking his rule of leaving the bed promptly at 7:15 in the morning.

He has made the luncheon hour the chief event of his private day, usually dining with Mrs. Wilson, his daughters Mr. Taft, and personal friends.

He has shown that a President can get into office all right without the formality and \$100,444 government expense of an inaugural ball.

He has discontinued the Presidential escort of police mounted on motorcycles, and is guarded only by Secret Service men in an auto.

He has not called any man a liar and has expressed no desire to increase the membership of the Ananias Club made famous by the colonel—Washington Herald.

NEWS OF DAY IN GEORGIA CAPITAL

Interesting Events of Late Happenings in Busy, Gassy, Bustling Atlanta.

Atlanta, March 2.—Lenten sentiment, apparently has not been strong enough to cope with or stem the craze for the new dances in Atlanta.

In the old days when there was nothing but the sedate waltz and the sometimes monotonous two-step scores of Atlanta debutantes and matrons found it an eminently proper thing to give up dancing for the forty days prior to Easter, but now, with the forty-nine forms of the hesitation waltz and a few others being invented every day, they don't want to quit, and they don't dare to quit.

"Why grudge me, if I staid away from the dances for a month I never would catch up on the new steps," said one lady when a more demure friend suggested to her the advisability of cutting out the dancing for the Lenten season.

As it is, the tango teas, and all the regular dances at the leading clubs are continued on regular schedule, just as if it were not Lent at all.

Because of a direct appeal from the bishop, a great many Catholic young people have given up the new dances, though in many instances the extreme reluctance. As the majority in the other churches, they simply haven't given them up at all.

Automobile Safe Vehicle.

Mrs. Robert Bowers, the plucky young woman who hid in the cellar with a revolver and fought a gun battle with the aggressors to prevent them from again robbing her gas meter, is saying some pretty painful things about the Atlanta police.

"I reported to them that my car was being robbed regularly by burglars," she complains and all they ever did me was that they would be sent to jail. I know what soon meant with them, and I know I wouldn't be able to have any spring hat if the police kept on, so I got my husband, a lawyer and went into the cellar and waited for the next night."

The burglars who were negroes, return Mrs. Bowers' fire, but she severely wounded one of them, and fortunately escaped unscathed herself. She says that the police who were coming "soon" got there fully a half hour after it was all over.

Atlanta, March 4.—The Atlanta Bible Conference at the Baptist Tabernacle is throughing the big auditorium with thoughtful folk drawn by the magic spell of such speakers as Dr. G. Campbell Morgan, Melvin Trotter and their fellow evangelists. One of the great addresses of yesterday was delivered by Dr. N. C. Poon Chen, the noted Chinese leader and vice consul for the Chinese in San Francisco.

Dr. Chen told China had put her back to the plow and would never turn.

"Her future is assured," he said. "She will take her place among the nations and be one of the world's great powers." But it will take time to work out the salvation of the country.

Dr. Mel Trotter is an unique figure among the speakers. He has none of the usual manner of the minister. He is the tallest of all, and the stamper of the stamp is full upon him. There are no notes about Mel Trotter.

He talked of the City Rescue Mission in his home town, Grand Rapids, Mich.

"They come in there and paw for the brass rail with both feet," he said. "We feed them the gospel over the same bar when they used to get their side."

The mission formerly was a bar room and burlesque theater and but few changes have been made in its fittings.

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Atlanta's segregated district was the wisest move ever made by the city. He says it worked in Grand Rapids and ultimately will solve the problem in Atlanta.

Dr. Anna Howard Shaw of New York, braving the pain of a broken leg, Miss Jane Addams, head of the famous Hull House of Chicago and eight other officers of the National Woman Suffrage Association will be the principal speakers at a mass meeting of the woman suffragists to be held at the Atlanta theatre next Wednesday evening, March 11.

The meeting will be the most significant gathering ever held in the south in the cause of woman suffrage. The speakers will deal with the question of "Votes for Women" in all its phases, embodying history, explanation and argument.

One of the Atlanta papers yesterday issued a special Woman Suffrage edition, giving several pages to the approaching meeting, with articles by noted writers.

Young Society women will act as ushers at the meeting and a number of prominent women will be the committee in charge of arrangements. John Temple Graves, a staunch advocate of votes for women, will introduce the speakers.

Charged with the murder of Mans Teel, in Harris county last December, J. R. Melton, a young farmer, went on trial for his life before Judge Hill yesterday in the Atlanta Superior Court. The case was brought to Atlanta under a change of venue to avoid a possible feud between the Teel and Melton families both of which include prominent citizens of Harris county.

The fight to put Charles B. Parker, formerly the emcee of the emcee of the DeKalb county farmer, behind the bars, a battle waged intermittently for ten years, will be resumed next week in the courts of the Stone Mountain circuit.

Parker has been arrested in Nebraska and is on his way to DeKalb county in the custody of an officer. He was arraigned ten years ago on charges brought by Miss Flora Tedder of a prominent family, was convicted and sentenced to ten years, had his case reversed, was again tried, again convicted and the decision reversed, and then jumped his bond and went west.

Howard will be among the array of lawyers in the case. He was solicitor when the litigation began, and is expected to join the prosecution in the coming trial.

Gov. W. S. West of Valdosta, newly appointed senator, will arrive in Washington today and be sworn in before the United States senate something tomorrow.

His commission was signed late Tuesday and mailed to him by Gov. Slaton to Senator Hoke Smith, who will introduce his new colleague and be his sponsor at the ceremony.

Senator West will announce his political plans very shortly after assuming his seat. Gov. Slaton will not announce his intentions as to candidacy for the senate until after Senator West's announcement. It is believed by his friends that Gov. Slaton will declare his candidacy for the United States senate within a short time.

It is believed that the governor and his opponents will by no means oppose each other and should Gov. Slaton decide to offer for the unexpired term, Senator West will not make the race for re-election.

Washington, March 4.—Chairman Anderson of the Interstate Commerce Commission today discussed with President Wilson the draft of a general law not proposed by Secretary Garrison for the regulation of water power projects in navigable streams.

Representative Rafter of Illinois also has obtained the views of the President, who endorses the principle of Mr. Garrison's plan.
