What's Next in Mexico.

Mexico, torn by forty-six revolts in the last 113 years, now faces trouble with its most powerful neighbor. Of these revolts twenty-two have been successful in themselves and disastrous for the men who led them. Three of these were in the present country and two of them, Vincente Guerrero and Francisco Madero, were assassinated. The successful revolutions were:

February 24, 1821—Spain loses Mexico and Augustin de Iturbide elected president-ten years and in 1822 crowned emperor.

May 11, 1823—Emperor Iturbide defeated by Santa Ana.

February 27, 1847—General Bustamante appeals to people and is elected president after several small uprisings.

July 27, 1852—Mexico City captured by General Urrea who proclaimed himself president.

August 2, 1854—Revolt led by General Barron results in overthrow of him of dual pronouncements against Bustamante.

December 6, 1854—General Herrera assumes government.

December 14, 1854—General Paredes deposes President Herrera.

August 4, 1854—General Jose M. Rains deposes Paredes.

July 27, 1855—Revolt started by General Blasquez and return of Santa Anna as president is announced.

July 27, 1855—General revolt shakes the country and Santa Anna flees.

October 1, 1855—Gen. Juan Alvarez takes president and succeeded by Ignacio Comonfort.

January, 1856—Comonfort is deposed and Benito Juarez becomes president when Comonfort flees to Brazil. Juarez returns to Mexico, leads revolt and becomes president.

November 1, 1857—Maximilian becomes emperor upon the leading of the French.

February 2, 1858—Juarez leads another successful revolt and again becomes president.

May 1, 1858—General Diaz leads a revolt in July.

November 2, 1877—Revolt led by Francisco Madero who becomes president.

February 18, 1911—Victoriano Huerta becomes president after the 2nd revolt.
