Anderson Firemen Go To Florence. Arrangements are being made for certain members of the Anderson fire department to go to Florence on June 23-24 and 25 for the State Firemen's tournament. Chief Jackson said yesterday that none of the paraphernalia of the local department would be shipped to Florence, on account of the great distance, but it is desired that some members of the local department be present, both to represent Anderson and to learn something. This is a fine opportunity for a fireman to pick up some new information about combating flames and if possible every man of the department should go.

Delayed Automobile Left Yesterday. F. M. Cliney of Aniston, Ala., and H. E. Leigh of Raleigh, N. C., who met with an accident Saturday afternoon when Mr. Cliney's automobile fell into the Savannah river, resumed their journey yesterday. The automobile was repaired in Anderson and looked as good as new when it drew up to the hotel yesterday morning, ready for the road. The machine did not suffer any severe damage and neither occupant of the car was injured. The Lewis spent Sunday in Anderson and they spoke in very complimentary terms of the city and of Anderson's people.

"Churches" Are Getting Crawls. The churches being operated by the Piedmont & Northern line to various points for negroes are drawing enormous crowds. Yesterday morning the interurban ran an excursion from Anderson to Spartanburg and it seemed as though every negro in Anderson county was trying to get on the train when it started from here. Several days ago an excursion went from here to Williamston and two cars were necessary to haul the bunch of Anderson negroes making the trip.

Dr. and Mrs. Rodgers Wood Home. Dr. and Mrs. Floyd D. Rodgers spent a few hours in Anderson yesterday, while enroute from Abbeville to Pickens. Anderson people will remember that Dr. Rodgers' automobile turned turtle with him near Williamston during the latter part of March, at which time Dr. Rodgers suffered a broken rib or two and several other injuries. He has been stationed at Abbeville for the last few months in connection with the work of the State Board of Health and goes to Pickens for a similar length of time on the same work.

Capt. Laughlin to Erect New Home. Capt. and Mrs. William Laughlin moved yesterday from the Chiquola hotel into their pretty new home on North Main street. Capt. Laughlin's home, together with all its furnishings, was destroyed by fire some months ago. His new home on the site of the old and is one of the prettiest bungalows in that section of the city. Mr. Simpson Died in North Carolina. Miss H. H. Simpson received a letter yesterday apprising her of the death of her brother-in-law, T. E. Simpson, which occurred at Bryson City, N. C. Mr. Simpson had been ill with some trouble and his death was not entirely unexpected, yet the sad intelligence came as a great shock to his numerous friends in this city. He had often visited here and was well known in Anderson county.

Neely Was Cut by Fleets. John Neely, a negro, was placed on trial in Magistrate Broadwell's court yesterday morning on a charge of assault and battery of a high and aggravated nature. It was charged that Neely attacked necker negro with a knife and cut him severely across the arms and shoulders that the physician had to take 54 stitches in the wounds. After hearing the evidence yesterday Magistrate Broadwell decided that the defendant must be to Court of General Sessions and he was accordingly bound over. He gave bonds in the sum of \$200 for his appearance and was released.

New Equipment For Local Rifles. The splendid new equipment for the Palmetto Rifles has arrived in Anderson from Columbia and the soldier boys are well pleased. The new paraphernalia consists of 50 new Kluks uniforms, the same number of blankets and hats and leggings for the entire company. Fifty new coats have also been secured for the use of the local militia.

Dr. Sanders in The Hospital. Dr. R. Lee Sanders is a patient in the Anderson County Hospital, suffering with an attack of appendicitis. He has not yet undergone an operation and it is hoped that he may soon improve to such an extent that an operation will not be necessary at this time. Dr. Sanders became ill Friday. Yesterday it was said at the hospital that his condition was considerably improved.

Mecklenburg Myth Again Celebrated. The Mecklenburg Myth is again being celebrated in North Carolina and people living in Charlotte and thereabouts have again fooled themselves into believing that there was such a thing as the Mecklenburg declaration of independence. Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Scarborough of this city have gone to Charlotte for the celebration and after spending several days there will go on to Beverly, Va., where they will spend a few weeks with friends and relatives.

Practically every member of the club has accepted invitation to attend.

Mr. Bottom made his headquarters in Greenville but frequently came to Anderson. He has been succeeded as manager of this well known firm by F. C. No Glades Found Here. According to the reports made at Clemson college following the examination of horses in oil pits of the State, there is not a single case of glanders to be found in Anderson county. The Clemson men made examinations in 11 counties of the State and found only two counties troubled with the disease, these being Wilkes and Mecklenburg; the reports say that not a single case was found in Anderson county out of the 43 states examined.
