GASTON AGAIN HEADS THE CONFEDERATE SONS ROUSING MEETING OF ORGANIZATION WAS HELD

OFFICERS CHOSEN Plan To Do More During Coming Year For S. C. Division Sons of Veterans Than Ever

The South Carolina Division, Sons of Veterans, held one of the most rousing meetings of its existence when it met in the court house yesterday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock. The reports were all splendid and showed the organization to be in better shape than for some years past.

The meeting was called to order by J. W. Quattlebaum, commander of Camp W. W. Humphreys of Anderson and he introduced the commander of the South Carolina Division, Col. Arthur L. Gaston of Chester. The maids and sponsors for the various camps presented their credentials and were seated.

Walter Rothrock, commander of the Second Brigade, was made secretary of the meeting, following which the Sons had the introductory remarks by Col. Gaston. The commander began by paying Anderson a number of pretty compliments on the hospitably shown to the veterans and the Sons of Veterans and then urged that every member of every camp be more zealous in the work during the coming year than he had been during the last.

Enrollment of camps was taken with the result, announced by the secretary, that five camps were represented there being: Camp W. W. Humphreys, Anderson; Camp South Carolina of the state at large; Camp Bernard E. Bee, of Aiken; Camp Easley of Easley and Camp Chester County of Chester. Their delegates were duly enrolled.

The following sponsors and maids of honor were introduced to the convention and were roundly applauded: Miss Annie Rothrock, Miss Wallace, Miss Burris, Miss Ruth Watkins, Miss Anna Tribble and the Misses Marfin. By the report of the Brigade Commander it was seen that all three brigades are in splendid condition and are making satisfactory progress in enrolling new members.

Gen. M. L. Bonham, a representative of the South Carolina Camp, then took the floor and made one of the most eloquent appeals for a more genuine endeavor on the part of the organization to make the Sons of Veterans an organization of which the veterans themselves may feel proud and an organization which may really accomplish something in perpetuating the deeds of the greatest army ever seen "on God's green earth." He said that he hoped the young men of the state might become aroused to their sacred duty and do their part toward perfecting the organization and with that he is in view to moved that a committee of three be appointed for the purpose of increasing the enrollment. T. Frank Watkins offered an amendment to the effect that the committee consist of five, that it be authorized to take up the question of organizing new camps in every town of importance in the state. They will also appoint sub-committees in the various towns to have active charge of the work. The motion was unanimously carried and the chair appointed on the committee the following members: Gen. M. L. Bonham, Anderson; J. M. Kinard, Newberry; Butler Hasgood, Barnwell; G. G. Godfrey, Cheraw and T. Frank Watkins, Anderson.

A telegram was read from Seymour Stewart, commander-in-chief of the Sons of Veterans. The message was sent from St. Louis and read: "I extend my greetings and very best wishes for your meeting."

A telegram was also received from N. B. Forrest of Memphis in which he said: "Illness in my family prevents my being present at your convention, but I extend very best wishes for its success and tender my kindest regards."

Proctor A. Bonham of Greenville called the attention of the body to the fact that the veterans were not provided with the amount of the pension furnished by the state and he moved that a committee be appointed for the purpose of taking up the matter with the general assembly of South Carolina and urging that provision be made for increasing the pension if

PARTY RULES SOON COMING UP Have Been Mailed From Columbia To Each of County Chairmen in South Carolina

Anderson people for the most part have already familiarized themselves with the general meaning of the new rules for the democratic party in this state concerning the primary election, but nevertheless they will be glad to learn that exact copies of the regulations as adopted in Columbia will soon be in the hands of the county chairmen.

Two hundred certified copies of the recently adopted constitution and rules of the South Carolina democratic party have been sent to each of the county chairmen with four exceptions, by W. C. McGowan, secretary of the state democratic executive committee. Charleston county was sent 1000 copies and Spartanburg, Richland and Greenville counties 600 copies each. The new enrollment books are now in the hands of the printer and it is thought that they will be ready for distribution in a few days.

Anderson has been the most lukewarm of all the towns there is said to be an increasing demand here for the formation of the league. Lists were prepared last night and will be circulated today by the fans, asking for subscriptions from the people of the city interested in baseball and it is believed that a good amount will be subscribed before night. Capt. R. J. Ramer yesterday agreed to purchase the soft drink concession and this will aid in giving the local team a start.

GODFREY GIVES HIS PLATFORM

States He Is In Favor of a Progressive Administration—Shows How Cut Expenses

In announcing my platform for mayor it is impossible to touch on all matters that will come up during my administration. I can only promise to handle those things to the best interest of the people.

In brief, I favor: 1st, A reduction in the amount of street tax from \$3 to \$2. The \$3 amount is not a hardship on many, but to the mechanics and laborers it is a burden.

2nd, I am opposed to the sanitary tax of \$2 or a sanitary tax for any amount, on the ground that it is equivalent to double taxation. The person who pays the sanitary tax also pays his pro rata share of the tax money for paying interest on sewerage bonds, and derives no benefit therefrom, whereas the man who pays the one tax, that is the tax for sewerage bond interest, derives benefit from the sewer system.

3rd, If elected mayor I will move my office into the office now occupied by the clerk and treasurer, so that I may be in close touch with all the affairs of the city. The business of all departments of the city, clear or go through the office of the clerk. I will assist the clerk during his busy seasons, while collecting licenses and taxes and while working on the outside, searching for delinquents. By doing this I will save the city \$900 annually, the salary now paid the assistant clerk. This saving will be almost equal to the annual salary of the mayor.

4th, I favor an extension of the sewerage system as fast as practically possible. Also favor all reasonable regulations looking toward the health of the city. I favor further removal of the city barns and stables from the business district of the city to the quarry lot, now owned by the city council on East Market street. The barns and stables are now in a dilapidated condition and will have to be rebuilt in the very near future.

5th, I am in favor and will work to secure some means to abate the dust nuisance.

6th, I am in favor of keeping the fire department up to its present high state of efficiency, and favor further the installation of an electrical alarm system as soon as the finances of the city will permit.

7th, Since so much has been said about granting franchises, I wish to put myself on record. Upon all such questions I favor submitting them to the people, and let the majority rule, as the franchises are the properties of the people.

COTTON GOES EVEN HIGHER

Yesterday Advance Was the Base For Further Advances In Cotton Futures

New York, May 27.—There was an even more active and excited demand in the cotton market today which sent prices into new high for the movement. Records for the season. The close was with most months selling at new high a shade off from the best under realizing, but firm at a net advance of 16 to 21 points. May contracts sold at 14 1/2 or 15 1/2 per bale above the low level of last March, while December touched 12 1/2 or 17 1/2 per bale above the recent low level. Cables were better than the continental buying of new crop months and the local market opened firm at an advance of 4 to 17 points.

COURT SURRENDERED TO CONFEDERATE VETS

NO MORE SESSIONS UNTIL FRIDAY

WILLIAMS GUILTY

Jury Returned a Verdict of Manslaughter in Case of Negro Charged With Murder

Following the completion of the case of Frank Williams, charged with murder, the court of general sessions for Anderson county stood adjournment yesterday morning, to continue in recess until Friday. This was done on account of the fact that the Confederate Reunion is in progress and the court surrendered to the veterans as has everything else in Anderson.

The only deliberations of the body Wednesday consisted of completing the case of the State versus Frank Williams, charged with murder. This case was begun Tuesday afternoon but was not completed and the court consumed about two hours yesterday morning in hearing the remainder of the testimony and the arguments of the attorneys. The jury, after a short deliberation, returned a verdict of guilty of manslaughter. Williams has not yet been sentenced.

WHISKEY MATTER TO BE SETTLED

Anderson Supervisor Has Chosen June 12 as Date To Begin Checking Names

On June 12 a committee consisting of J. Mack King, county superintendent, J. S. Acker, county clerk, and a pro-whiskey man and anti-whiskey man will begin canvassing the names on the petitions, recently presented to Mr. King, praying for an election in this county on the question of a dispensary. This was the announcement made yesterday by Mr. King.

It is planned to have every name on the petitions compared and checked with those on the registration books. When the canvass is completed the supervisor will determine whether or not one-fourth of the qualified voters of the county have signed the petitions. If that number of signatures be found Mr. King will order that an election be held in Anderson for the purpose of determining whether or not the people want the dispensary and if there is not one-fourth it will mean that no such election can take place.

Rev. J. L. Harley of Spartanburg of the Anti-Saloon League was in the city yesterday and announced that he would be here on June 12 and witness the checking of the signatures.
