SAMSON WILL BE SHOWN TOMORROW

Great Biblical Feature at the Bijou Theatre Greatest Feature Ever Shown Here

The story of Samson is the story of the strongest man who ever lived; his name today is known to almost every man, woman and child throughout the civilized world, and even to those who do not know his story his name is a synonym of strength. Now Samson meets Delilah who, at the instigation of Shon, the ruler of the Philistines, entices from him the secret of his great strength, shears his head and delivers him to the soldiers, who put out his eyes and after beating him almost to death, put him to work in the grinding mill.

Some time later, the Philistines, giving a feast in the Temple of Dagon, sent for the blind Samson to make sport for them while they feasted. He comes, led by a small boy. In desperation at the humiliation put upon him he asks the boy to lead him to the pillars which support the temple. Praying to the Lord to give him back his strength this once, he leans upon the pillars, and the roof of the Great Temple of Dagon comes tumbling down upon the multitude. And those who he slew at his death were more than all they which he killed during his lifetime.

PROCLAMATION

STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA, Executive Department

PROCLAMATION WHEREAS information has been received at this Department that divers persons, in various parts of the State of South Carolina, are endeavoring to procure other persons to vote for or against certain candidates in the primary election, which is to be held on the twenty-fifth day of August A. D. one thousand nine hundred and fourteen by the payment or the promise of money, or other articles of value, by threats, mistreatment, abuse or intimidation, in violation of the Statute Laws of the State of South Carolina, in such case made and provided as follows: Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1912, Vol. III. "Section 350 BRIBERY AT ELECTIONS—this statute, any person hereafter held within this State, whether general, special or pri-

many, for members of congress of the United States, members of the Legislature of this State, Sheriff, Clerk, Judge of Probate or other county officers, Mayor and Aldermen of any city, Intendant and Warden of any incorporated town, officers of the militia or any volunteer organizations of the State or of any other election held within this state any person shall, by the payment, delivery or promise of money or other article of value, procure another vote for or against any particular candidate or measure the person so promising any person so voting, shall each be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall for the first offense, be fined in any sum not less than one hundred dollars, and imprisoned for any period of time not less than one month nor more than six months; and for the second offense, shall be fined in any sum not less than five hundred dollars, nor more than five thousand dollars, and imprisoned for any period of time not less than three months nor more than twelve months.

PRECINCT UNLAWFUL—It shall be unlawful hereafter for any person to sell, barter or give away or treat any voter to any malt or intoxicating liquor within one mile of any voting precinct during any primary or any other election day, under a penalty upon conviction thereof, of not more than one hundred dollars (\$100), nor more than thirty (30) days imprisonment with labor.

Section 367 ABUSING VOTERS ETC.—If any person shall at any of the elections in any city, town, ward or polling precinct, threaten, mistreat, or abuse any voter, with a view to control or intimidate him from the free exercise of his right of suffrage, such offender shall suffer fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the court.

Section 368 ASSAULT, ETC., ON ACCOUNT OF POLITICAL OPINIONS—Whoever shall assault or intimidate any citizen because of political opinions or the exercise of political rights and privileges guaranteed to every citizen of the United States by the Constitution and Laws thereof, or by the Constitution and Laws of the State, or for such reason, discharge such citizen from employment or occupation, or eject such citizen from employment of occupation, or effect such citizen from rented house or land or other property, such person shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof, be fined not less than fifty nor more than one thousand dollars, or be imprisoned not less than three months nor more than one year, or both, at the discretion of the Court.

NOW THEREFORE, I, COLE L. BLAISE, governor of the State of South Carolina, in order that justice may be done and the majesty of the law upheld, do hereby offer a reward of ONE HUNDRED (\$100) DOLLARS CASH for the first ten (10) convictions of any person or persons, who shall be found guilty under said Laws, provided said ten (10) convictions shall be had in ten (10) different Counties of said State. IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State to be affixed, at Columbia, this first day of June, A. D. one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, and in the one hundred and thirty-eighth year of the Independence of the United States of America. (Signed) COLE L. BLAISE, Governor.
