COURT HOUSE CROWDED TO HEAR CANDIDATES

not in favor of the Southern Public Utilities franchise.

J. L. E. Jones from Ward 1, was the last speaker from that ward. He said that he was in favor of "knocking the bound out of the Southern Public Utilities Company's 40-year franchise if it could be done," and says that it can be done if it is done in the right way. He wants the negroes prevented from loafing on the streets at night. The speaker referred to some paving already done as being very poor and said that he would like to see more paving of the right kind done. He favors cutting down the city's expenses. He said that when he came to Anderson he paid \$5 per year taxes and is now paying \$158 and this shows that he must have business ability.

Wards Two and Three. The only candidate from Ward 2 is Walter Dobbins and he merely paid his compliments to the voters.

H. H. Acker, candidate from Ward 3, was absent.

B. F. Johnson from ward 3, asked that the voters vote for honest, sober, upright men for all offices. He believes he can qualify along these lines and thanked the voters in anticipation of their support.

C. F. Spearman, the incumbent, was the next speaker from Ward 3. The speaker thanked the people for the vote he received two year ago when he was elected alderman and said that his two years' experience had prepared him to fill the office for the next term in a more capable manner than he ever had before and said that any improvement which would prove to be to Anderson's advantage was what he wanted. He discussed the franchise and asked the voters to consult the records and see how he stood on the matter. He said that the records would show who voted against the franchise. He said that experience was necessary in the alderman's job. He promised that he would be able to serve the people better for the next two years than he had in the past.

From Ward Four. Keys Glimmer, the incumbent from Ward 4, said that he had been an alderman for only 30 days but during that time he has already acquired the hobby of working only for ward 4. He wants better sidewalks and improvements for his ward. He said that some streets and sidewalks in the city are positively impassable and such conditions should be remedied and will be if his vote will count. He believes that the Southern Public Utilities Company's franchise should be annulled if it can be done and he will lend his assistance to such an undertaking. He promised that he would sprinkle every street in ward 4 if he should be re-elected. He said that if he didn't give satisfaction the people of the ward could prepare a petition and secure 25 signers and he would at once resign without waiting two years.

J. H. Tate, candidate from Ward 4, said that he was familiar with running for alderman, having made the race once before. He promised to use his best judgment in all matters coming before council should he be elected and believes that he will be the next alderman. From Ward Five. J. A. Harbin from Ward 5, said that he was beaten by only one vote for alderman last year and he would like to have a few more next time. He promised if elected to serve the people wisely and well in all things. B. R. King, candidate from Ward 5, told a number of jokes and got his hearers in a good humor. He then said that one plank in his platform reached from one end of town to the other and this is to have the streets paved from one end to the other. When all that is done he wants to see the Blue Ridge railroad extended through the mountains to Knoxville.

Dr. W. F. Ashmore. Next came the speakers for the office of mayor and these candidates drew straws to see who would speak first. Dr. W. F. Ashmore was the first candidate to appear. Dr. Ashmore said that ward politics played havoc with a city and he wants to see this eliminated. He called as a lie the statement circulated some time ago that he was to withdraw from the race and said his presence last night showed this to be untrue. He favors for Anderson the best sanitary methods possible and his position as the chairman of the board of health has taught him what the city needs along this line. He is in favor of street paving to make a city.

If elected mayor he will fight any issue that will result in an extremely large amount of money and favors the extension of the Blue Ridge railroad through the mountains to the west. He will be controlled by no one man or party of men and is controlled by no one party. He says that he has no campaign manager and that he is able to run his own affairs. He opposes any franchise for 40 years and thinks that this is too long. He will have to be shown, if he is elected, why this franchise was granted and whether or not it is legal. He admits that the white way is a thing of beauty but believes that the grant-

ing of the contract showed had business policy. He said that two of his opponents were in favor of abolishing some of the sanitary arrangements and defended his course in this matter. He is in favor of making the sanitary tax of \$1.50, making it universal. He is in favor of setting aside these dues for the use of the board of health and for the extension of the sewerage system. He believes he can save the city \$1,720 per year in salaries and would like to have the change to prove this. He wants the city tables moved to the city lot and as chairman of the board of health has made that recommendation.

In regard to the dust nuisance he believes if the traction company were made to sprinkle the streets it would ever that the nuisance would be greatly abated. He thinks that the fire department should be left entirely alone as he believes that it is the best in the United States. E. E. He stated that he secured a job, and made good, and that he was drawn, as if by a magnet, to the city of Anderson, that he came here and he expects to stay here and be next mayor of this city. The intended insinuation was that there was some cloud hanging over his head when he left Cheraw, was false, Mr. Godfrey declared earnestly.

Campaign Lie No. 2, as termed by Mr. Godfrey, was a report current that John M. Hubbard, a local merchant, was disgruntled or displeased with a tax transaction, which occurred in the office of the city treasurer five years ago. After explaining in detail the report, which the candidate stated was intended to injure him in the race, Mr. Godfrey read a letter, which Mr. Hubbard had voluntarily sent him

all his time to caring for the place. He says when he is elected mayor next Tuesday he can assure the people of satisfaction in all lines and a fair square deal to everyone. This closed the meeting on the part of the crowd. The concluding meeting will take place tonight at Anderson Mill, when the candidates for aldermen from Ward 6 will also speak.

Vantie Failed.

Sandy Hook, N. Y., June 11.—Her time allowance of three minutes and 12 seconds today gave the yacht Resolute the sixth race with the Vantie, sailed in the lightest of air over a three-mile triangular course. The Vantie led at the finish by one minute and 57 seconds, but the Resolute was awarded the race on corrected time by one minute and 16 seconds.

The Defiance, the third cup defender aspirant, made no effort to race today, as her sails need recutting and her mast requires alterations. The Vantie today once more showed that by reaching she is a minutes faster than the Resolute. She pulled out a lead of more than four minutes at the first turn and was doing well on the second leg, also a reach, until she ran into a reef spot, when the Resolute's first

The light up the wind to the finish was the finest struggle in which the two yachts have engaged. The Resolute caught the Vantie at one time, but lost her inside of place a few minutes later and was 500 yards astern leading, slipped through the water as if they had motors, kicking head. Vantie turned the first mark four minutes and 41 seconds to the good. There was only one minute and 43 seconds between the yachts at the second turn.

The Vantie drew away gradually then, but could not gain enough to save the penalty with which her larger body and sail spread had imposed upon her. The yachts will race tomorrow.

Mrs. Bud Fisher Hurt. New York, June 11.—Mrs. Pauline Fisher, aged 23, wife of "Bud" Fisher, the cartoonist was severely injured when two motor cars collided here early today. Five other occupants of the cars were less seriously injured. First reports said that Mrs. Fisher had been fatally hurt. Later it was said at the hospital where she was taken after the accident that her condition was much improved. One of the cars overturned, pinning Mrs. Fisher beneath it.

Overruled Demurrer. Chicago, June 11.—Judge Carpenter today overruled the demurrer of the Federal Baseball League to the \$75,000 damage suit brought by the Philadelphia National League club because of the desertion of Doolan, Seaton, Knabs and Brennan to the new organization. The defendants were given sixty days to answer the suit and a similar time was allowed them in the injunction proceedings brought by the Philadelphia Nationals to restrain the Federal League from taking any more players from them.
