SITUATION BAD

An Attorney Says Chicago Bank Failure Could Hardly Be Worse. (By Associated Press.) Chicago, June 19.—Maclay Hoynes, states attorney, announced tonight he would begin an immediate investigation of the affairs of the La Salle Street Trust and Savings Bank to determine if criminal charges would be brought against its officers.

The bank's affairs, now are in the hands of W. C. Niblack, vice president of the Chicago Trust and Trust Company, appointed receiver today. His bond was fixed at \$2,500,000.

The states attorney said he had been drawn into the bank investigation by a complaint of criminality brought by a depositor.

"I know the situation, now," he added, "and I don't see how it could be worse."

SOUTHERN TRAIN WRECK

Danville, Va., June 19.—Two pullman cars on Southern northbound No. 36 fast mail were derailed at Gretna, 35 miles northward at 4:15 this afternoon, just as the train was passing the Southbound fast mail on a double track. The pullmans sideswiped the whole length of the other train, but steel coaches saved it from serious injury. Ticket Collector Charles A. Douglas, of train No. 35, suffered a severe cut on the face and is in a hospital here. No one else was injured, mentioned. A broken brake-riding caused the wreck.

Refugees From Tepic.

On Board U. S. S. California, Mazatlan, June 18.—By wireless to San Diego, Cal., June 19.—Refugees arrived here today by the Pacific Mail liner City of Para, report that conditions in the besieged city of Tepic are deplorable, but the censorship is so strict that no details are obtainable. Forty American refugees left for San Francisco today on the Para. The long strain of the siege and the shortage of food are driving out even those foreigners who have hitherto been most obstinate in the defense of their business interests.

BRADSTREET'S. New York, June 19.—Bradstreet's WIN says tomorrow: "Excellent all round crop advices continue to extend to the circle of optimism which indicates a greater rate than actual buying. However, evidences of improvement in trade are accumulating in the surplus crop growing sections which is in sharp contrast to that noticed in the essential industry regions. But over a large area distribution at retail is better, wholesale trade is looking up, demand for iron and steel is larger, collections are somewhat easier, and traffic on the Western railroads is increasing and heavy rates of wheat for export are reported. Activity is the keynote of northwestern reports, reports from the winter wheat belts are accurate, in the mid-west interior distributors are buying freely, and trade news from the South, though somewhat mixed, is more encouraging in the main because of the favorable trend of reports. On the other hand trade from the east develops rather slowly and a similar statement applies to the Pacific northwest."
