LEAGUE SEASON OPENS TUESDAY

ANDERSON WILL PLAY FIRST GAME ON THE GAFFNEY GROUNDS

A SCHEDULE MADE

Spartanburg Will Play Its First Game in Greenville With T. Stouch.

Special To The Intelligencer. Greenville, June 22.—The schedule drafted by Tommie C. Stouch, manager of the local baseball club, was adopted without change by officials of the Piedmont league at a meeting here this afternoon.

Anderson will open at Gaffney Thursday afternoon for a series of three games, while Spartanburg opens in this city. The resignation of Watson Bell, of The Anderson Daily Intelligencer, as secretary and treasurer of the league, was accepted with regret.

The meeting was an enthusiastic one and all four cities of the league were represented. All arrangements for the opening series were made.

Only the question of umpires caused any lengthy discussion, and this was settled when a motion by Manager Martin of the Spartanburg club, providing that each team select its umpire, was adopted unanimously.

A ROYAL RECEPTION

Awaits the Anderson Ball Team on Visit to Gaffney.

At yesterday's meeting of the directors of the Piedmont League, held in Greenville, a number of changes were made in the schedule. Instead of Anderson opening next Thursday at Greenville as had been planned, the home team will open at Gaffney and Greenville will open at Spartanburg.

The first question taken up was that of the schedule and this was submitted by Tommie Stouch of Greenville. After some few alterations and changes were made, the schedule proposed by the Greenville man was adopted and this will be followed from Thursday on.

Another important matter decided at yesterday's meeting was that each town would furnish one local umpire. No Anderson man has yet been chosen. Speaking of the opening of the league between Gaffney and Anderson with Anderson in Gaffney, Ed H. DeCamp said that Gaffney would rather have Anderson there than any other town and that a royal reception would be accorded them.

It is understood that Stackhouse, manager of the Gaffney team, and once a famous star for the Wofford team, will pitch the opening game for his club against Anderson. Arrangements were begun last night for securing a special car for the Anderson fans to go to Gaffney for the opening game and this will probably be accomplished.
