Financial and Commercial

New York Cotton

New York, July 10.—After an opening decline carried August contracts into new low grounds for the movement, the cotton market steadied and closed very steady at a net advance of 2 to 12 points.

Private reports indicating further scattering showers in the Southwest caused some selling in Liverpool before the local opening and the market here started at a decline of 1 to 8 points in response to cables. Offerings, however, started, were more or less active and more general than earlier in the week. It is being claimed that the market should be pretty well liquidated. Prices soon turned steadier on covering, however, all support, and talk of an improving trade demand around the 12 cent level. The term belt forecast for generally fair weather probably promoted the advance, while the detailed weather report for the Houston district did indicate that the precipitation had been at all general.

New Orleans Cotton

New Orleans, July 10.—Short covering was the main sustaining influence in the cotton market Friday. It was stimulated by drouthy conditions in Texas and was met only by slender offerings. Bulls called the market oversold. At the best of the day the more active months were 10 to 11 points over the final figures of yesterday. The close was a net gain of 5 to 10 points.

In the morning, the market went to a net decline of 7 to 8 points on selling, based on poor cables and reports of rains in Texas. These reports proved not to be well founded, and sellers of the morning turned to buyers in the afternoon.

The week-end figures were bearish but they had no influence on the market.

Cotton futures closed steady. July 1277; August 1269; October 1233; December 1235; January 1239; March 1250. Spot cotton quiet, unchanged; middling 13.5-16; strict middling 13.11-15. Sales on the spot 719 bales; to arrive none.

Liverpool Cotton

Liverpool, July 10.—Spot cotton easier; good middling 785; middling 733; mid-middling 685; sales 6,000; speculation and export 500. Receipts 17,000.

Futures steady. July 708; July and August 708; September and October 668; December and January 655 1-2; February and March 657; April and May 659.

Cotton Seed Oil

New York, July 10.—Cotton seed oil was a shade higher, the result of light clearing, scattered covering of shorts and local buying on the firmness of kindred markets. Final prices were 1 to 4 points net higher. Sales 6,800 barrels. The market closed steady. Spot 720 a 720.

Stocks and Bonds

New York, July 10.—Investment issues began today to show the cumulative effect of the continued heavy selling of Gould issues, New Haven, Chesapeake and Ohio and other low priced securities. These and other stocks and bonds established new low records. The New Haven and Chesapeake declines were especially noteworthy because they savored strongly of liquidation. The sale of miscellaneous international railway stocks without interest, pending actual delivery, indicated that foreign holders were pressing the sale of American securities.

London was heavy on recrudescence of the Ulster troubles, with money and discounts higher.

The local market was weak and in the final hour selling of the leaders overshadowed previous desiring in the important stocks. Speculative favorites fell one to three points with little or no recovery. The character of the general market may be gauged from a twenty point decline in the 5 per cent bonds of the Chicago and Eastern Illinois Railroad, whose affairs are involved in the Frisco receivership.

A few crumbs of comfort were offered in the course of the day, the United States Steel Corporation reporting a slight increase of tonnage for June. A wide variety of bonds were pressed for sale, but recessions were only nominal except in certain issues, where special influences operated. Total sales par value \$1,423,000.

United States government bonds were unchanged on call.

Grain and Provisions

Chicago, July 10.—Skepticism regarding the chances of wide-spread damage by blackrust brought about a lowering of values in wheat. The market although steady at the close, was 1-2 to 5-8 a 3-4 under last night. Corn finished 1-8 a 1-4 off to 3-8 up. Oats 1-8 to 5-8 higher and provisions unchanged to a rise of 2c.

Cotton Goods Market

New York, July 10.—Cotton goods markets were steadier today with gray goods sales more effective. Wool markets were firm and quiet. Silks were in demand for fall.

Weekly Letter

New York, July 10.—Selling has not been so heavy and aggressive as it was right after the publication of the July bureau, but the cotton market has been unsettled during the past week and prices have made new low ground for the movement, with October contracts selling at \$5 per bale under the high records of June 1. The decline has been accompanied by more or less bearish talk in local circles, and predictions of still lower prices have evidently been encouraged by unfavorable trade advices, good weather over the greater part of the belt, and an impression that the crop had continued to improve since the government recurred the data for the last condition report.

The smaller exports of cotton goods for the month of June as shown by the British board of trade returns and the talk of a curtailment among the domestic mills, leading to predictions of a falling off in supply and distributions for the past month, have figured in bearish predictions, but there has been some uneasiness as to the crop outlook in Texas where very little rain has fallen since the middle of June. Scattering showers have been reported in that section during the past two or three days but they have not been sufficiently heavy or general entirely to relieve apprehensions, while some traders have taken the short time recommendations of the governing committee of the International Spinners' Federation as indicating a slack immediate demand and a desire to influence the raw material market. The situation in this respect, combined with bull predictions of an increasing demand from spinners around the 12 cent level has probably restricted fresh offerings for short account on the decline and seemed to be largely responsible for today's rally of some 15 or 20 points from the lowest.

DUNN'S REVIEW

New York, July 10.—Dun's review will say tomorrow:

"Irregularity still characterizes the business season. Favorable reports predominate and general conditions afforded encouragement, although the volume of new business is of moderate proportions. Indications of improvement are noted in iron and steel, where a turn for the better is at last apparent. The betterment was accompanied by some strengthening of price and few manufacturers are disposed to book future contracts at the present price. Manufacturers of textiles are endeavoring to meet the slackened demand by curtailing the output and stocks of goods are stated to be in a well liquidated position. Most interests in the trade are anticipating a more active period later on as a consequence of abundant crops. Shoe manufacturers are more optimistic. Of the 31 quotations compiled by Dun's review there were 23 advances and 17 declines this week, this being the first occasion in some time that the general trend of the leading farm products has been upward. Commercial failures were 293 against 238 last year."

Secretary Daniels Names Quartet of Fighters.

Washington, July 10.—Secretary Daniels announced today that four new dreadnaughts, beginning with No. 39 would be named Arizona, California, Mississippi and Idaho. The last two were so named in order that the states of Mississippi and Idaho might not lose a ship because of the recent sale of the two battleships to Greece.

"It is every day," said Secretary Daniels as he announced the names of the new vessels, "that the secretary of the navy has the privilege of naming a quartet of battleships. With the newly named battleships, every State in the Union now has a battleship named for it except Maryland, Montana, South Dakota, Washington, West Virginia, Colorado, North Carolina, New Mexico and Tennessee."

In the future the armored cruiser California will be known as the San Diego.
