LOCALS GOT GAME ON FORFEIT RULE

SPARTANS FAILED TO APPEAR YESTERDAY

MAY BE PROTESTED

Spartanburg Manager Claims He Did Not Receive Sufficient Notice But Game Comes Here

Manager Bull and his husky bunch of ball players trooped to Buena Vista park yesterday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock and patiently awaited the arrival of the Spartanburg team. When that aggregation failed to appear the umpire declared the game forfeited to Anderson by the score of 9 to 0 and therefore Anderson again takes a spurt ahead of the Spartanburg team.

The netire muddle over the schedule yesterday came about in the following manner: It was determined Saturday that the schedule must be changed since Anderson and Greenville have been playing steadily and continually since the league opened and the same has been true of Spartanburg and Gaffney. With Greenville playing in Anderson for these three days, according to the schedule, it would have been impossible to get a crowd out for the game. It was therefore decided that Greenville would go to Gaffney and Spartanburg would come to Anderson and at 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon telegrams to that effect were sent to Spartanburg, Gaffney and Greenville. Both Gaffney and Greenville did play in Gaffney yesterday but Manager Martin claims that he did not get his in time to make arrangements. However, the telegraph company has no record of the message remaining undelivered.

Manager Martin said yesterday that some of his players were in the mountains and did not return until 1 o'clock, too late to catch a train for Anderson, but he lost sight of the fact that a train leaves Spartanburg at 1:55 which comes through to Anderson direct and would have gotten the Spartanburg team here in time to play the game, had they so desired.

It is the general opinion in Anderson that Mr. Martin refused to bring the Spartanburg team to Anderson for the first game between those two towns, simply because he was aware of the fact that the gate receipts for first series between these two cities would be larger than for an subsequent series.

The action of the local team in claiming the forfeited game is based upon three fact. 1. That Manager Martin was telegraphed at the same time that the other towns were. 2. That Harold Booker of Greenville, secretary of the league was asked Saturday to make the change and said that he would do so and third that Manager Martin talked to Anderson over the telephone before the last train left Spartanburg for Anderson and after his players had all returned to the city.

There is little doubt but that the league officials will count the game for Anderson.

LOST THEIR WAY

E. J. Watson Says That Roads in This County Should Have Sign Posts To Guide People

E. J. Watson, commissioner of agriculture for South Carolina, and his camera man, passed through the city, spending Sunday night in the city. The party is making an inspection of the Columbia-Lake Toxaway highway and traveling in a luxurious automobile, they are finding the trip very pleasant. The commissioner was very much disgruntled yesterday morning when he talked to newspaper men over the fact that some of Anderson county people are hurting themselves every day that they let the present condition of things continue. He pointed out that it would not take any more than \$50 to post every road leading into the city.

The party got lost Sunday night and had great difficulty in finding the way into the city. Mr. Watson says that once before he lost his way when he was coming to Anderson and says that he thinks Anderson merchants should be more wile-awake in their opportunities than to permit such conditions to exist. Mr. Watson said that he was finding great interest manifested in all towns and counties through which he passed, and concerning the mountain highway and that the people seem to appreciate the work being done. Mr. Watson and his party got an early start from Anderson yesterday morning for the mountains.

Tomato Juice for Stains.
