## STATE FARMERS UNION MEETING

ANDERSON TO BE HOST TO STATE MEETING ON JULY 22-24

### BARRETT IS COMING

National President Barrett Will Make Open Address on Principle of Farmers' Union

The Anderson county farmers' union met Tuesday at the court house with the largest attendance of members and delegates at any meeting in its history. The meeting was held mainly to complete arrangements for the meeting of the state union which will be held here from July 22 to 24. The amount of enthusiasm manifested on the part of those present, and the good reports had, were most gratifying.

President J. W. Rothrock presided over the meeting yesterday and appointed several additional members of the arrangements committee, so that the full membership of the committee is now as follows: J. W. Rothrock, J. M. Broyles, G. W. Yelton, T. T. Wakefield, Foster Brown, J. C. Strilling. One of the members of the original committee, H. H. Acker, is in the hospital recovering from an attack of appendicitis.

While the full details of the meeting have not as yet been worked out the meeting will be filled with interesting and timely deliberations. The first session will be held Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock.

The second day, Thursday, will be devoted to an excursion to Clemson College. President Riggs having extended an invitation to the union to spend a day as the guests of the college.

Friday, the last day will be given over to an open meeting, to which all the framers of the county are invited. The national president, G. S. Barrett, will be here and will probably deliver an address on Friday to the public. He is a forceful speaker and will give much information to the public.

At least seventy-five delegates from over the state are expected to attend the meeting. J. Whitner Reid, the state secretary, will arrive in Anderson in advance of the meeting. The state president is E. W. Dobbs of Sumter, who is well known in Anderson.

### J. HASKELL DENDY

Death Case After An Illness of Typhoid Fever.

Richland, July 14.—After a brief illness J. Haskell Dendy died Saturday morning at 3 o'clock. Mr. Dendy had been ill only a short time with typhoid fever and his condition was not thought serious until the end was near. Mr. Dendy was the youngest son of the late Thomas Dendy, one of the oldest and widely known families of this county and the state. He leaves a wife who was Miss Carolyn Wideman of Due West, also one son, James. He also leaves the following brothers and sisters: Prof. J. P. Dendy, Lexington, Ga.; Prof. W. E. Dendy of Monroe, Ga.; Rev. J. T. Dendy, Rock Hill, S. C.; J. A. Dendy of Anderson, S. C.; Miss Mary Gaines of Irwington, Ga.; Mrs. Mary Gaines of Lavonia, Ga.; and Mrs. Susan Keuhn, of Reading, Kans. Besides these he leaves a large number of near relatives and friends to mourn his death. He was a member of the Richland Camp No. 469, W. O. U.

The remains were laid to rest Saturday afternoon at 5 o'clock at the Presbyterian church at this place.

### J. B. PRUITT DIED AT AGE OF 82

One of Anderson's Best Citizens—Funeral Services This Afternoon

News was received in the city last night of the death of one of Anderson's truest citizens, J. B. Pruitt, who passed away at 9 o'clock at his home at Starr. He had been unwell for two months, but recently had rallied a little. He was in his 82nd year. Mr. Pruitt was a native of this county and his long and useful life has been known of all the older citizens.

Mr. Pruitt was a good old soldier, and served in Orr's regiment, a member of Capt. Cowan's company. Mrs. Lou Ashley of this city and Mrs. Lizzie Kay are surviving sisters of the deceased.
