Rain
Broke Up Both Games in Piedmont League Yesterday—Anderson at Home Tomorrow
Gaffney and Spartanburg both experienced a heavy rainfall yesterday afternoon about 3 o'clock, which caused the games to be played in the Piedmont league yesterday. Greenville was scheduled to play at Gaffney and Anderson at Spartanburg.
The two teams will play in these same towns today and then tomorrow the Anderson team will come home to play Thursday, Friday and Saturday with Spartanburg. Next Monday Greenville will come here for three games.
It is understood that Manager McColl yesterday materially strengthened the Anderson club by signing some new players. Mobly will come home with the locals as a catcher, Hough will be found on shortstop and a new outfielder has been secured in the person of White. McColl says that the Anderson team to be seen in Thursday's game will be 50 per cent better than it was in the series with Gaffney.
George Rice is spending this week in working out and getting himself in good shape and he may be picked to hurl the opener against Spartanburg. Either Eice or Watson will hurl in the opening game, as McAllister will probably pitch for Anderson this afternoon.
The locals will probably win the exhibition in Spartanburg today and then it is fairly safe to assert that the home hopes can cop two of three from the Spartans on the home grounds during the last three days of the week.

CITIZENS THEY
Three Convicts Whose Rights Have Been Restored.

Columbia, July 28.—Pardons to two men to restore citizenship and pardon to one man convicted of housebreaking and larceny were recorded in the office of the secretary of state. All are white men.
Pardon was granted to David Holcomb, convicted of housebreaking and larceny at the May, 1914, term of court for Greenville county, and sentenced to serve three months on the county's public works. W. L. Henderson, convicted at the August, 1907, term of court for Saluda county of manslaughter and given by Judge R. C. Watts a sentence of 13 years imprisonment, was pardoned to restore citizenship. Henderson was paroled March 30, 1911.
Tom Kibler, convicted at the November, 1888, term of court for Edgefield county and given by Judge T. B. Frazer a sentence of one year in the state penitentiary was pardoned to restore his citizenship.

HELP HAIL SUFFERERS

PLENTY OF MONEY
Millions Going to Europe Will Not Cause Inconvenience to U. S.
Washington, July 28.—With a billion and nearly three hundred million dollars stored in the treasury vaults and about \$600,000,000 more of coin in circulation, treasury officials said tonight that the United States had no more cause for alarm over the tremendous shipments of gold from New York to war clouded Europe.
Secretary McAdoo explained that the country never was in better position to send some of its millions abroad and declared there was nothing to fear from the drain to meet European demands. It was pointed out also, that the gold now going to Europe soon would be coming back to pay for the vast quantities of food and supplies this country would be called upon to ship across the water.

INCIDENT CLOSED
Deputy Sheriff Says He Did Not Mean to Be Brutal to Dog.
During the hear riot which occurred at the campaign meeting at Greenville, there was one incident which caused a great deal of indignation. Jake Gosnell, a deputy sheriff, kicked a little dog that had been running around on the stand and when the crowd jeered at Governor Blaine about something that Senator Smith said in reply he threw the little dog into the crowd, striking in the face an elderly man from Pickens county.
Mayor John B. Marshall did not like the matter a little bit, although he did not know who Gosnell was and directed that prosecution be started. The matter was settled in the city court Monday in a harmonious way when Gosnell pleaded guilty and was fined \$5. Sheriff Hendrix Rector made a statement that the dog had been a nuisance on the stand and had tried to bite Gosnell, and the latter disclaimed any intention to ill treat the dog.

MURDER TRIAL BEGINS
Mrs. Hall's Fate to Be Decided by Jury Now Seized.
(By Associated Press.)
Louisiana, Va., July 28.—In Louisiana circuit court today, with Judge Shackelford presiding, the jury was completed for the trial of Mrs. Victor Hall, charged with the murder in his store at Green Springs on April 15, of her husband. Counsel for the accused woman asked that his client be tried under the new law which leaves to the discretion of the jury whether the death penalty shall be enacted or a prison sentence imposed.
It was this lawyer himself who introduced the statute in the general assembly and caused it to be incorporated in the code of Virginia.
Mrs. Hall pleaded not guilty to the charge of murder. She bore the first day's ordeal unflinchingly and apparently was the calmest person in the 56 witness room. The examination of the 56 witnesses for the commonwealth and 28 for the defense will begin tomorrow. It is expected that the trial will take from ten days to two weeks.

ORAL WAGERS LEGAL

Supreme Court Upholds Decision in Regard to Race Track Gambling.
(By Associated Press.)
New York, July 28.—The legality of oral betting at a race track, provided no money passes when the bet is made, was again upheld yesterday by Justice Madden in the supreme court in Brooklyn in the case of Daniel O'Brien and Charles A. Ballard, bookmakers, arrested at the Aqueduct track on June 21. The finding sustains a similar decision rendered by Justice Scudder a year ago.
