

It has been arranged for the cars to come through the freight yards of the Piedmont & Northern system and therefore the big cars will hereafter come over the city lines only from Tribbie street down to the square. People living along Greenville street will be greatly pleased over this announcement.

It is said that this school is making progress and that the people of the Piercetown section are proud of it.

Street Car To Be Painted

The street car running on the city lines from the square to the Brogan mill blossomed out yesterday in handsome colors. The car was painted in Anderson and it has 66 coats of paint. The car is finished in colors adopted by the Southern Public Utilities Co. for all its city cars in Charlotte, Winston-Salem, Greenville and Anderson and is what is known as orange and canary with aluminum leaf letters. The car is trimmed in black and tuncson red and makes a nice showing. All the other cars in Anderson will be painted within the next few weeks and the public will be immensely pleased over the change.

Institute Was Not Held Here

Owing to the demoralized condition of affairs here yesterday, superinduced by the election, J. W. Rothrock determined that the idea of holding the Farmers' Institute in this city yesterday was not feasible and accordingly he notified the speakers at Clemson college not to come. Mr. Rothrock said last night that he would try to arrange for a later meeting to be held in Anderson. The Institute will be held today at Long Branch and the people of that section say that the attendance will be good.

Again Election Was Only Talk

Yesterday in Anderson was much similar to the day before in one respect. Election "dope" was all that one could hear and The Intelligencer office was crowded all day long with voters, anxious to get the earliest news possible. One voter, much disgruntled with the governor, sent him a telegram yesterday morning, in accordance with reports, in which he told the chief executive that he (the voter) hoped he would never hear of Bleasheim again.

INNES BEGINS TO TALK

Now Says the Missing Nelms Girls Were Not Murdered

Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 26.—Telegrams from Portland, Ore., today say that Victor E. Innes, accused, with his wife, of the murder of Beatrice Nelms and Eloise Nelms, is on his way to San Antonio under the charge of a Texas sheriff, and his wife is also a prisoner en route to the supposed scene of the murder.

Innes broke his silence at a surprise to the officer by declaring that the missing girls were alive and that he spent some time with them after they left Atlanta last June. This is in direct contradiction to his former statements that he had heard nothing of them for months since their disappearance.

Mrs. Innes also had stated that she had never seen the girls yet she has admitted being with her husband in town where he says he saw them. Innes makes the startling declaration that the girls are not dead, but when asked "where are they?" he merely stares at the questioner and shuts his lips tight.

Austrians Win Victory

Berlin, Aug. 26.—(By Wire) to the Associated Press via Nauen and Bayville, L. I.—Official reports made public in Vienna and received here by telegraph say that a battle of three days' duration at Kraamir (in Russian Poland, 28 miles southwest of Lublin) ended yesterday in a complete Austrian victory. The Russian forces were repulsed along the entire front of 70 kilometers (42 miles) and are now in full flight in the direction of Labin.

SLATON IS HOPEFUL

Georgia Governor Thinks He Will Get the Senate

Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 26.—Friends of Governor Slaton—and he never knew how many there were until the fight made against him to take from him the senatorial nomination—are pointing out today the rules of the Georgia state democratic executive committee as prima facie evidence that he is entitled to the nomination without a contest.

Rule 10 of these official rules says: "If any two persons receive an equal number of unit votes for any nomination the one who receives the largest number of popular votes in said primary shall be declared the nominee."

It makes no mention of the one receiving a "greater" number, but it is clearly indicated that upon the popular vote, other things being "equal" shall rest the nomination. Governor Slaton received far more than an "equal" number of unit votes and an even greater proportion of popular votes, and it is argued that under this rule, as well as by all rules of fair and honest dealing, the candidate who so led his ticket and received so great a plurality of popular votes, is entitled to the place.

Governor Slaton is extremely sanguine. He feels absolute confidence that the great mass of the people of his state will not permit any juggling or jockeying among their delegates which shall deprive the voters of the power to express their own choice and have it followed.

(By Associated Press.) Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 26.—The "girl" for whom Atlanta was once named celebrated her birthday yesterday. She was 87 years old, but almost as sprightly as her namesake.

Mrs. Martha Lumpkin Compton was a little girl when this city was a group of wooden houses at the terminus of a new railroad through the wilderness. Her father was Governor Lumpkin, and when it was decided that the village should have a name the founders of the future city thought "Marthasville" as pretty a name as could be chosen.

Later on, just before the Civil War, the name was again changed, this time to Atlanta.

Mrs. Compton observed her birthday by a dinner to a few old friends. She told them many stories of old Georgia from her unflinching fund.
