

Manning

Columbia, August 31.—Richard I. Manning, candidate for governor, will this week visit the Piedmont section of South Carolina. He will deliver addresses in Anderson, Greenville and Spartanburg counties.

Reports from all sections of South Carolina are that Mr. Manning is strong in the rural districts. He is a successful farmer and there are many planks in his platform in the interest of the rural districts. Mr. Manning is said to be particularly strong in Anderson county, where he numbers his personal friends by the hundred.

In Spartanburg county he has a strong following. John G. Clinkscales carried Spartanburg county by a big majority and he will throw his strength for the Sumner man. In Kershaw county Mendel L. Smith is already at work in the interest of Mr. Manning. Another strong ally is Mr. Cooper.

The state Democratic executive committee has been called to meet in Columbia Tuesday at noon in the library at the state house when contests and protests will be heard. The committee will also declare the results of the first primary. The order for the second primary to be held on September 8, one week from Tuesday will be issued by the committee.

W. C. McCown, secretary of the Democratic state committee, states that complete returns had been filed by all of the counties. He will order the tickets printed for the second primary after the meeting of the executive committee.

Since the election there have been many rumors. One was to the effect that John G. Richards would withdraw from the race and that Governor Bleasie would enter. This of course was impossible. It is said here that Gov. Bleasie is taking his defeat good naturedly.

The governor has made no announcement as to what he will do after retiring from office early in January. One rumor is to the effect that he will practice law in Anderson. It was said this morning that he would locate in Columbia.

The anti-administration forces in all sections of the state are being urged to go to the polls on September 8 and vote. "It is dangerous to be over-confident. We must work until the very last moment. Don't take the election of Manning for granted, but work until he is elected," said a leader this morning, discussing the situation.

The anti-administration forces will be in absolute control of the next general assembly. It is estimated that more than 90 per cent of the members of the house and senate will be opposed to the policies of the present governor.

SOFT DRINK TAX IS ADVOCATED Government May Place Tax on Railroad Tickets and Tickets To All Places of Amusement

(By Associated Press.) Washington, August 31.—A tax on soft drinks as well as beer and patent medicines is contemplated by members of the house ways and means committee, which is preparing an internal imports. It is urged that soft drinks are as much luxuries as wines or beer and that an equitable distribution of the tax burden among all consumers would be accomplished by this plan.

Another suggestion is a stamp of five or ten cent on railroad tickets and admission to theatres, baseball parks and other licensed amusements. It is estimated that from \$50,000,000 to \$50,000,000 could be raised in this way.

The committee has not yet determined upon a complete taxation plan, but purpose to hasten its deliberations so a bill may be introduced as soon after President Wilson addresses congress on the subject, which probably will be immediately upon his return from New Hampshire. Administration leaders are impressed with the necessity of quick action.

PENSION WANTED Effort Being Made To Secure Pension Widows and Orphans War Vets. (By Associated Press.)

Louisville, Ky., August 31.—Concerted action looking to the enactment of federal legislation which would provide pensions for the widows and orphans of Spanish-American war veterans was recommended in the report of the legislative committee of the United Spanish-American war veterans in annual session here today.

It is estimated that 2,000 veterans attended the opening session of the convention. Commander-in-chief W. W. Lewis Smith of Washington, D. C. presided. Welcome addresses and reports of officers occupied the day.

MORATORIUM EXTENDED London, August 31.—David Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer, announced in the House of commons tonight that the moratorium would be extended a month. It would be too risky, he said, to end it at once.
