Electric City Sparklets
Give One Day To the Orphans.
There are few people in Anderson so eagerly that they would refuse to see the fruits of one day's labor to the homeless orphans of South Carolina and Alabama. Every man in the city could easily give to the orphan institutions whatever sum he makes on one day out of the whole year. Saturday, September 26, has been officially declared "Work Day for Orphans" and on this day every man is supposed to make a contribution of whatever pay he received for the day's work, to the orphanage of his selection. The plan was put into execution in South Carolina some years ago and it has been very successful. Anderson people will do their share this year and as a result of what this city alone will do, dozens of homeless little tots will be cared for.

Teachers Plan For Rally Day.
A meeting of the teachers and officers of St. John's Methodist church was held at the church last night to plan for "Rally Day" which has been fixed for September 27th. The meeting was held in the basement of the church and a delightful repast served by the ladies present. It is planned to have interesting exercises and to secure the return to the school of all members who have been absent during the vacation period. An interesting exercise planned is the graduation of the Junior Members of this department of the school entitled to the distinction of graduation. These number about 20 pupils, and the graduation exercises are most interesting. In addition to this other features are planned, and the public is invited to attend.

Yesterday was the first official "ladies' day" since the Elks moved into their handsome new home. A number of the ladies of the city called at the home during the afternoon and they said that they were very appreciative of the kindness of the Elks. It is believed that Friday will become a popular day with the ladies for their visits to the club.

Presbyterians Are To Meet in Union.
The Presbyterians of Anderson, and there are many, are much interested in the approaching session of Synod. The Presbyterian Synod is to convene this year on October 12 at Union and it is probable that there will be a large attendance from all parts of the state. It is expected that there will be between 200 and 300 ministers present and many laymen as well. The people of Union have already begun making preparations for taking care of the large number of visitors.

Ex-Governor Was Here Yesterday.
Hon. John Gary Evans of Spartanburg, formerly governor of South Carolina and now chairman of the state democratic executive committee, was in Anderson yesterday for a few hours. Mr. Evans says that the outlook for the South is far from gloomy in his opinion and he believes that the South and more especially South Carolina, will profit from the experience which it is now undergoing. He believes that the war, when it is settled, will result in the South being richer by hundreds of dollars than it ever was before.

Anderson Musicians Issue A Challenge
SECOND REGIMENT THROWS DOWN GAUNTLET
A SPLENDID BAND
Anderson Band Wants Chance To Show What It Can Do At Coming State Fair

It is probable that the directors of the South Carolina fair association will meet within the next few days for the purpose of selecting the bands to furnish the music for the Fair which is to be held this year during the latter part of October. Among the applicants to be considered is the second regiment band of Orr mill in Anderson and it is said that this band will be one of the strongest contenders for the honor. Director Hendrickson yesterday invited the Anderson chamber of commerce and took steps which will put the Second Regiment band in the running. Director Yarbrough, when he filled that position on the band, closed a contract with the State fair officials for this well known band to serve during the fair and it is understood that at that time the local band furnished better music than the visitors to the fair had ever enjoyed before. It is believed that the local band has a good chance to win out and Director Hendrickson is so confident that this band could do as well as any other band in the state that he has issued a challenge in which he says that he will enter a contest with any other band or bands of the state and let it be decided which is the best organization. The director stipulates that every band entering the contest put in the sum of \$50 and then after the judges have reached a decision that the winning band get the entire amount of the "pot."

Anderson people would like very much to see the Second Regiment band win out and they are confident that the local men can do as well as any band to be found in South Carolina.

A telegram was received in Anderson yesterday from William Notes, a well known theatrical man of Washington, D. C., saying that he will come to Anderson on Saturday, Sept. 26, to meet with the board of directors of the Anderson Development company. Mr. Notes will make a proposition to lease the handsome theatre which is now being erected in this city, and which will be completed in time for some attractions to be booked before the present theatrical season is over. The Washington man is now lessee of several of the best known theatres in the country, being connected with amusement places in Washington, Norfolk, Atlantic City and other points and he is in close touch with several of the largest and best known dramatic companies playing through the South. It is believed that Mr. Notes, if he gets the lease here, can put on some better attractions than will be seen in other cities of this size, especially in view of the fact that the stage here will be large enough to handle such attractions as Ben Hur, Caesar's Friend or any other extravaganza.
