A Marathon

Negro Was "Some" Sprinter But Was Taken in Charge by the Police After a Chase.

About one-half the white people and all the negroes in town collected on the public square last night to see the police take in charge a negro named Goode Fuller. Fuller wandered into The Leader store last night and seeing a hat that he liked (good taste, too, a John B. Stetson) he appropriated same and was well toward the back of the door before any one discovered the theft. The clerks yelled "stop thief," and then a merry chase was on. Goode has long borne a reputation as a sprinter in Anderson and he nobly upheld it last night, making a block in less than nothing flat, before he ran into the arms of a pedestrian and was turned over to Fire Chief Jackson and Patrolman Whitten. The negro was searched when he was taken to the city hall and was then placed in a cell.
 Fuller claims that he has been traveling with a carnival and that he left this attraction at Lake City last week but it is understood that everything points to his having broken into a store at Honea Path about two weeks ago and he will be held on that charge after he gets rid of the present indictment.
 The Anderson city officials also have a warrant for him, charging him with stealing clothes from another negro on May 21.

Error Made

Telegram From Columbia Says That Belton's Name Will Be Placed Back on the List.

According to a telegram received yesterday from G. W. Sullivan Senator from Anderson county, the name of Belton was omitted from the list of towns allowed to assess abutting property for permanent improvements, in the ballot which is to go before the people of the State at the coming General Election, through a mistake. The Senator advises that the Secretary of State has promised to correct the mistake, to place Belton's name on the tickets and to have such additional advertising done as may be necessary.
 The Senator advises in his telegram that he has investigated the matter thoroughly and that he will write to J. Mack King, county supervisor, giving in detail the way the mistake occurred. Anderson people will rejoice with Belton that the matter has been straightened out.

Exposition

Building to Represent South Carolina at San Francisco is to Be a Beauty.

"The South Carolina Building, when it is completed and opened to the public, will be one of the handsomest at the Exposition," writes Charles K. Bryant of Richmond, Va., to the Anderson Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Bryant refers to the building which this State will erect at the Panama Exposition. The Richmond architect, designer of the Virginia building for the Exposition, has also been chosen to draw the plans for the South Carolina building and the Palmetto representative will be an exact replica of either the South Carolina Society building of Fort Sumter, both at Charleston. The architect is preparing plans for both of the buildings, either of which will cost about \$15,000 and will submit them to the South Carolina commission before anything is done.

Dance Monday

University Boys Taking Long Hike.
 Edward P. Bernard and John H. Culnan of Marinette, Wis., students at the University of Wisconsin, decided that they had had enough of college life for awhile and that they would take a year off. They therefore set out on a "hike" over the country and arrived in Anderson last night, putting up here for the night. They left Wisconsin on August 12, since which time they have been tramping it steadily. They went first to Portland, Maine, and since that time they have traveled 2,611 miles, 1,000 miles of which was on boat. They are traveling toward New Orleans and when they reach that city they will set out for San Francisco, which city they hope to reach in time for the Panama exposition. They talked interestingly of their travels and said that they were absolutely delighted with everything they saw in South Carolina and they were particularly well pleased with Anderson and Anderson people.

Street Car Left The Rails Friday.
 A north Main street car, running over the Southern Public Utilities company tracks, got out from under control of the motorman Friday night and jumped the tracks at an abrupt curve on north Main street. The track was wet, as a result of the rains and it is said that the car was hitting a pretty lively clip when it went over on the sidewalk. No one was injured and very little damage was done.

Merchants Said "Business Is Fine."
 Cotton didn't go up on the local market yesterday but that did not prevent Anderson merchants from enjoying a splendid business. The price of the fleecy staple remained at 63-4 cents in Anderson yesterday but last night almost every merchant in the city reported that his day's business had exceeded expectations. "I will admit," said one well known merchant, "that the day opened pretty poorly with us. We didn't do much business until afternoon but the rest of the day more than made up for the off morning." Anderson people have about reached the conclusion that cotton doesn't have quite as much to do with local business as they at one time thought.

New Office to Be Very Modern.
 The finishing touches are now being put on the Ligon & Ledbetter office building, to be occupied within the next few weeks by the Western Union Telegraph office in this city. The floors have been oiled and the painting has been finished and when the new furniture arrives for the office the building will be occupied by the telegraph company. This is to be one of the handsomest, most complete and up-to-date offices in the city and T. E. Howard, manager of the Anderson office, says that he is well pleased in every respect. The new furniture to be installed in this building will be made to order and will make Anderson people sit up and take notice when they see it. The entire Ligon & Ledbetter building will be something of a sensation when it is completed by the contractors and turned over to the owners.

Mayor Refused to Let Dance Go On.
 Should a man be allowed to dance in any manner sullying his fancy or should he not? It appears that the city officials Friday did not think so, at least they didn't think that one of the performers at the Palmetto theatre should have carte blanche in this matter, although it later transpired that the party thought by the mayor to be a woman was a man. The Palmetto theatre vaudeville company put on a Spanish dance during the afternoon, at which time a female impersonator did quite a sensational dance. The story goes that the mayor was in the audience and when he got back to the city hall he instructed the chief of police to have the dance cut off the afternoon's program. Harry Curzon, who was doing the dance, really is some little impersonator, since has been posing as a member of the chorus all week and getting away with it, but when he took off his wig Friday afternoon it was thought that every member of the audience would recognize the fact that he was a man. As a matter of fact the dance "went on right merrily" for the remainder of Friday.

 Dr. M. D. Campbell will leave Anderson at 4:40 o'clock this afternoon for Columbia where he goes to receive the members of the South Carolina Optical association when they arrive tomorrow morning. Dr. Campbell is president of the association and says that the meeting to be held in Columbia Monday and Tuesday will be one of the best in the history of the association. A very interesting program has been arranged and several good speakers have been secured for the two days. The deliberations will all take place at the Imperial hotel in Columbia.

Another Circus For Anderson.

The new engine is of the latest make and is said to be as good as money can buy. The four new cars also purchased by the Blue Ridge railroad, will be delivered on or about November 1. Will Hurry Work On the Court House.
 Since the court of general sessions for Anderson county is due to begin another session on November 16, the contractors in charge of the improvements at the court house will necessarily have to hurry their work. At present almost half the floor is out of the court house and the whole place is badly disarranged. It will require some quick work if the new offices are completed and ready for use by the 16th of next month.

Mr. Hare Probably Coming For Address.
 It is highly probably that F. C. Hare of Clemson college, in charge of the poultry work of that institution, will be secured to deliver an address here when the second annual Anderson County Poultry show takes place in the Pepper building on Whitner street on November 17. This affair is to be held jointly by the Anderson chamber of commerce and the poultry association, organized a few weeks ago. One thousand programs for the show have been printed and are now at the chamber of commerce where the public can secure copies. Secretary Campbell of Belton, spending yesterday in the city, said that all plans for the new show were complete, so far as he knows, and he expects many fanciers to attend.
