### THIRD ARREST IN ARSON CASE MADE

FRED SIMMONS ARRESTED IN SAVANNAH AND HELD FOR SHERIFF

### ONE RELEASED MANY INVITED

J. F. Simmons Released Yesterday on Bond of \$300 by the Pelzer Magistrate.

Receiving advices yesterday from authorities at Savannah that they had arrested Fred Simmons, a young white man wanted here on charges of complicity in the burning of a building at Pelzer a year ago, Sheriff Ashley left yesterday afternoon for the Savannah city to bring the defendant back to Anderson.

It was not anticipated that Simmons would offer any resistance to returning to South Carolina without requisition papers, and it is expected that the sheriff will get back today or tomorrow with his prisoner. Fred Simmons is a brother of J. F. Simmons, who was arrested in Greenville last Saturday on charges of having assisted in the burning of the building. J. F. Simmons was brought to Anderson Sunday and placed in the county jail. Yesterday he was carried before Magistrate Bonner, at Pelzer, who admitted him to bail in the sum of \$300.

A young white man by the name of Oscar Sergeant, who is charged with having fired the building, was arrested here Saturday and still occupies a cell in the county jail. It is understood that the warrant issued for the arrest of Sergeant charges the serious offense of arson, as the building which was burned, a store room, was in close proximity to a dwelling which was occupied at the time of the fire.

The storeroom which was burned belonged to one of the Simmons boys and it is alleged that it was burned in order that the insurance might be collected. It was stated yesterday that a detective had been at work on the case for the past several months, and as the warrants were issued upon the affidavits of Deputy State Insurance Commissioner Wharton it would appear that there is truth in this report.

When seen Monday by a representative of the Intelligencer both Simmons and Sergeant talked very freely of the occurrence. Both, of course, denied having anything to do with the burning of the building. J. F. Simmons is well known here, he having conducted the Blue Ridge Cafe here a year or so ago. All three parties alleged to have been implicated in the affair have made Pelzer their home. It is stated, for the past several years.

### EXPECT RECORD COTTON CROP

R. H. Edmunds Says Growers Injured Themselves Through Over Production.

Richard H. Edmunds, of the Manufacturers' Record of Baltimore, says as a result of a trip through the cotton States:

"It should be borne in mind by cotton producers that they have this year grown, provided they pick it all, a crop that will largely exceed any ever before produced. Many of the best informed cotton men in the South do not believe that cotton would have sold above 9 cents a pound, even if there had been no war, in view of the immensity of the crop, and some think a still lower price would have prevailed.

"The cotton growers have deliberately injured themselves. Disregarding all teaching and experience, they have kept on increasing their acreage. With better cultivation, and this year with a magnificent growing season, they have produced more than the world would have needed had all the spindles of this and other lands been as busy as could be."

## Grain Elevator Rally on Dec. 7

GATHERING OF FARMERS TO BE HELD IN COUNTY COURT HOUSE

THE PROPOSITION Will Be Put in Definite Shape by Committee and Presented

The laying of plans for a big gathering of farmers and business men of Anderson county in the court house on December 7 for the purpose of thoroughly understanding and "putting across" the grain elevator proposition was the outcome of the meeting held yesterday at the Chamber of Commerce for the purpose of discussing the feasibility and advisability of erecting here a plant for the creation of a market for and handling the grain which will be produced in this county. A general committee was appointed to stir up interest in the meeting to be held on December 7, while a sub-committee was appointed to map out a program for the gathering and put the proposition in definite shape for placing before the people.

### Interesting Discussion.

The meeting yesterday was held under the auspices of the grain elevator committee of the Chamber of Commerce, Judge J. S. Fowler being chairman, and presiding at the conference. A small but representative number of farmers were present. Small numbers, however, had nothing to do with the amount of interest taken in the matter under discussion, for practically every one in attendance on the meeting had something to say with reference to the proposition.

The elevator project was thoroughly discussed from every point of view. It was explained for the benefit of those not familiar with the effect a grain elevator would have on a community like this that it would create here a market for the grain, and that the same could be sold there for cash. The standard market prices would

prevail at the elevator. In addition to affording a market for grain, an elevator would put the grain in commercial shape, that is, clean and grade it.

It is popular.

Of those present at the meeting not one spoke against the advisability of erecting a grain elevator here to create a market for the grain, which would be raised in this county and providing a means of handling the same properly. After the matter had been thoroughly discussed it was decided that inasmuch as so few farmers were at the meeting an opportunity would be given every planter in the county to familiarize himself with the project, and that a big gathering of farmers would be held in the court house on Saturday in December, the

meeting to begin at 11 o'clock. The committee on arrangements will have some well known authorities on the subject to address the meeting, and a concrete proposition will be laid before the farmers and business men of the county, after which they will be given an opportunity to subscribe to the capital stock of the proposed elevator company.
