RUSSIAN MOTHER'S LETTER

Touchingly Beautiful Epistle Found in Pocket of Dead Officer.

(London Letter to New York Herald.) "Your father was killed very far from us, Laogon, and I send you for the sacred duty of defending our dear country from the vile and dreadful enemy. Remember you are the son of a hero. My heart is oppressed and I weep when I ask you to be worthy of him. With kisses and blessings have I parted with you. When you are sent to perform great deeds don't remember my tears, but only my blessing. God save you, my dear, bright, loved child. Once more: It is written everywhere the enemy is cruel and savage. Don't be led by blind vengeance. Don't raise your hand at a fallen one, but be gracious to those whose fate is to fall into your hands." It was a letter from a mother to her son, found in the breast pocket of a Russian officer killed in action.
