'Squire W. C. Bramlett Died Friday.

After an illness of several months 'Squire W. C. Bramlett died at his home near here last Friday, the 18th inst. His death while not unexpected, was quite a shock to his friends and loved ones. He had been in failing health for several months and the terrible malady which caused his death would not yield to the treatment of the most skillful physicians. He had lived in and near this place for twenty years or more and by his quiet, fearless and upright life had won the esteem and confidence of all who knew him. For a few years after coming to Pickens he engaged in merchandising and finding this too confining moved to the country and farmed several years. About five or six years ago he returned to this place, was elected magistrate and held the office until this year, when his health gave way. He was in his sixty-first year and is survived by his widow and a son, Prof. Andrew Bramlett, of Clemson College, and daughter, Mrs. J. M. Looper, of Dacusville.

His remains were laid to rest in the cemetery here Saturday afternoon in the presence of many sorrowing friends, the funeral services being conducted by Rev. Mr. Mills, pastor of the Presbyterian church at Clemson College.

Several years ago he united with the Griffin Baptist church and has ever since lived a consistent christian life. His many friends join in condolences to the bereaved ones.

The Central team would have made a much better score but for an accident to Kelly, one of their best men, who sprained his ankle in vaulting. At this time the score was Furman 19, Central 18.

About 700 people witnessed the events, many from this county being present.

Score by schools: Furman Fitting School 44; Central 20; Westminster 14; Easley 9; Richland 4; Greenville and Walhalla 3; Fountain Inn and Laurens 1; Seneca 0.

The Central team is composed of Kelley, Falls, Morgan and Shirley. The Easley team is composed of Ellison, Able, Welborn, Rogers, Folger and Perry.

Since the association's organization the following schools have won first place: 1908, Easley; 1909, Westminster; 1910, Westminster; 1911, Easley; 1912, Greenville; 1913, Furman Fitting school.

In the oratorical contest Friday night, Waddy Duncan, of Walhalla won first place, James Poag, of Greenville, second, and Philip Price, of Fountain Inn, third.
