

The Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Co. has just finished making extensive improvements in their plant in Pickens. A force of linemen, under the supervision of J. A. Redfearn, has been here for the past four weeks making the changes and improvements. The central office has been moved from over the postoffice to the second story of the Pickens Bank building and the switchboard has been overhauled. The improvements cost the telephone company about \$1,400.

Considerably more tax money has been collected by the county treasurer this year than at the same time last year. Up to January 15 last year \$50,000 in round numbers had been collected. Up to January 1 this year about \$105,000 had been collected. Still more than half of the tax receipts remain on the books. A one per cent penalty is being collected this month and a two per cent penalty will be collected in February. After February the penalty will be 7 per cent until March 15, when the tax books close.


