To Teachers.—The County Board of Examiners are receiving a number of inquiries about the schools and about the examination of teachers. Instructions have been received that no certificates shall be issued except after formal examination, due notice of the time of which will be given. The examiners will not examine any applicant except on the day assigned. The examination will not contain what are known as "catch questions" but will be directed to ascertaining what knowledge the applicant has on fundamental and general points of knowledge. It is suggested that all who wish to stand the examination should get their arithmetics, grammars, American histories, geographies and readers, and refresh their memories on the salient points of each. It is a very risky experiment to try to stand an examination without previous preparation. Among the books, which may be of advantage, are Maury's or Warren's physical geography; or Swinton's larger geography; Hart's or Quackenbos' or Bullion's, or Clark's grammar; Davies, Robinson's, or Sanford's arithmetic; Swinton's or any other good American history. Applicants for higher grades should review Algebra also. A good book on the theory of teaching is "How to Teach." There are two books, "Stone's Questions" and "Swett's Questions," which are compiled from examination papers in different States, and which give some idea as to what kind of questions is generally asked in examinations. Of course the board does not pretend to say that its examination papers will be taken from these books. But they are useful to applicants in preparing. All these books, or similar ones, can be got at the book stores, and will prove a good investment. The people demand that the teachers shall be competent, and teachers can become competent only by preparation.

here in discharge of official duties, like all other members of Congress, and besides he had noted in the capacity of Senator years before the present indictment was brought against him in the South Carolina court.

The decision concludes as follows: "I think I am bound to take judicial cognizance of the fact that party organization is one thing, and a faction to destroy it is another. The most cruel tyranny would be the application of civil forms of law to the dominance or triumph of the passion of a faction. I cannot reconcile it to my sense of duty to give aid in placing manacles and handcuffs around and about the individual citizen for the purpose of surrendering him bound into the hands of those who may not be dispassionate enough to vindicate the true rights of the individual, or to those who might be led by impassioned appeals to a condition of mind they could not resist. Zeal for the correction of wrong has often led to the conviction of the innocent. It is the duty of courts to sit still, deliberate, and, with civil procedure, throw their protection in such a direction as may curb or control every word and action. Let the man be remanded to the body of which he is a member. That body is legally, constitutionally, morally, intellectually incapacitated to dispose of the question involved, and to condemn or acquit. I discharge him from arrest on the warrant for his extradition, and the same is hereby ordered."
