**ARRESTED AND RELEASED.**—Mr. A. Walker Brown, of Winnboro, was arrested by a negro deputy marshal on Saturday, and went down to Columbia on Sunday afternoon for a preliminary examination. **IMPORTANT POSTAL REGULATION.**—The Postmaster General has issued a circular revoking the regulations regarding third-class matter, recently in operation. In future everything wholly or partly in writing must be remitted at first-class rates. The importance of this ruling will be understood when it is known that all bills, bills of lading and other forms of merely business statements, which have hitherto passed through the mails as third-class matter, requiring only one cent postage, will in the future be treated as first-class and need to be accompanied with a three cent stamp to secure their transmittance.

**DEATHS.**—Mrs. John L. Black died at her husband's residence in this county, on Thursday night the 17th instant. She had been in feeble health for some time, but pneumonia was the immediate cause of her death. Mrs. Black was a daughter of Mr. Joseph Black, for many years a prominent citizen of Richland. She leaves six daughters, one of them an infant of a few months old. To Colonel Black and his family is extended the warmest sympathy of many friends in this their bereavement.

Mrs. Belle Stitt, wife of Mr. J. T.

Stitt, died at her home on Sunday night. Mrs. Stitt was in the twenty-sixth year of her age, and was a daughter of the late John M. Milling of this county. She was an estimable lady, and had many friends. She leaves her husband and one child to mourn her untimely death.

**REORGANIZATION OF THE FAIRFIELD COUNTY BIBLE SOCIETY.**—According to previous notice, there was a meeting of the different congregations of this town held in the Presbyterian church at 4 o'clock p. m. on last Sabbath in the interest of the Bible cause. It appearing that the Auxiliary Bible Society of Fairfield county had fallen into a state of suspension, the object of the meeting was to survive and reorganize it. The Rev. C. H. Wiley, District Superintendent of the American Bible Society for North and South Carolina, being present, delivered an address, after which a collection was taken up, and it was resolved to reorganize and revive the Fairfield County Bible Society. Upon motion it was ordered that the assets of the old Society be turned over to the Treasurer of the newly organized one. After some other remarks the meeting was adjourned with the benediction by the Rev. C. H. Wiley. A meeting of the Executive Committee was held afterwards, the result of which will be published in our next issue.
