Whereas petitions signed by a legal number of the qualified electors and free-holders residing in Cross Hill school district No. 6, Laurens county, South Carolina, asking for an election upon the question of voting a 3 mill tax upon the property in said school district to be used for school purposes, have been filed with the county board of education, an election is hereby ordered upon said question, said election to be held on the 11th day of August, 1914, at Old Mountville school house of the trustees of said school district.
Only such electors as return real or personal property for taxation and who exhibit their tax receipts and registration certificates as required in

the general election shall be allowed to vote.
Those favoring the 3 mill tax shall vote a ballot containing the word "YES" written or printed thereon. Those against the 3 mill tax shall vote a ballot containing the word "NO" written or printed thereon. Polls shall open at the hour of 8 o'clock in the forenoon and shall remain open until the hour of 4 o'clock in the afternoon when they shall be closed, and the ballots counted.
The trustees shall report the result of the election to the county auditor and county superintendent of education within ten days thereafter.

Whereas, petitions signed by a legal number of the qualified electors and free-holders residing in Cross Hill school district No. 6, Laurens county, South Carolina, asking for an election upon the question of voting out of No. 16 High School Unit thereby voting off the two mill high school tax, have been filed with the county board of education, an election is hereby ordered upon said question, said election to be held on the 11th day of August, 1914, at Old Mountville school house in said district, under the management of the trustees of said school district.
Only such electors as return real or personal property for taxation and who exhibit their tax receipts and registration certificates as required in the general election shall be allowed to vote.
Those favoring remaining in the high school unit shall vote a ballot containing the words "FOR HIGH SCHOOLS" written or printed thereon. Those against the high school unit shall vote a ballot containing the words "AGAINST HIGH SCHOOLS" written or printed thereon. Polls shall open at the hour of 8 o'clock in the forenoon and shall remain open until the hour of 4 o'clock in the afternoon when they shall be closed and the ballots counted.
The trustees shall report the result of the election to the county auditor and county superintendent of education within ten days thereafter.
