The Books of the County Treasurer will be opened for the collection of State, County and Commutation Road Taxes for fiscal year, 1915, at the Treasurer's office from October 15th to December 31st, 1915. After December 31st one per cent will be added. After January 31st, two per cent will be added, and after February 28th, seven per cent will be added till the 15th day of March, 1916, when the books will be closed.

All persons owning property in more than one Township are requested to call for receipts in each of the several Townships in which the property is located. This is important, as additional cost and penalty may be attached.

All able-bodied male citizens between the ages of 21 and 60 years of age are liable to pay a poll tax of \$1.00 except old soldiers, who are exempt at 50 years of age. Commutation Road Tax \$1.50 in lieu of road duty.

**POSITION OF GREECE
 MUST BE MADE CLEAR**

Allies Demand That Country Either Fulfill Obligations or Demobilize. Blockade of Empire to Impress Ruler.

London, Nov. 21.—The entente allies have demanded that Greece either join with them and fulfill her treaty obligations to Serbia or demobilize, and to impress King Constantine that they mean what they say the allies have declared a commercial blockade of the Hellenic empire, according to Athens dispatches. There is no confirmation of these statements here but it is certain that Lord Kitchener, the British war secretary, who had an hour's audience with the king of Greece yesterday and afterward saw Premier Skouloudis took a firm stand.

The Greek cabinet met to consider the situation and a few hours should show Greece's attitude. The Greek government again has affirmed its friendliness to the allies, but has not taken the steps required to prevent Greece from being counted among the friends of the central powers.

The entente will not permit any delay; the position of the Serbian armies makes any prolongation of the present uncertainty impossible. Already the Serbians are making what may be their last stand before Monastir and also on the plains of Kossovo.

The Bulgarians, it is true, are being held up by unfavorable weather, but they must be almost at the gates of the Macedonian capital and the Austro-Germans and Bulgarians are slowly but surely pressing back the northern army.

The Germans announce today the capture of Novapazar and therefore are on the direct road to Mitrovitzka, which has been the Serbian capital since Nish fell into the hands of the Bulgarians.

Other armies are pressing in from the north, the northwest, the northeast and the east and even the Montenegrins, who held their positions long, are being forced back.

Of the French and British troops in the south no news has been received. Apparently they only are holding their positions and no longer can hope to be of assistance to the Serbians except by keeping a large number of Bulgarians engaged. German reports say the French and British will try to save the Serbians by sending troops through Montenegro and Albania, but with poor roads it will take a long time for them to reach the battlefields.

There is no change on the other front. The Italians still are fighting for Goritzia and the Russians are regaining ground lost along the Svir river last week. Czartorysk, a little village unknown before the war, and which became famous for bitter fighting around it, again is in possession of the Russians, who evidently let the Germans enter simply to shell them out the next day.

The German attack, which met with initial success, was doomed to final failure, as the country around is a great marsh, and in the opinion of Petrograd, the offensive was taken for political not military purpose with the object of impressing the Roumanians.

In the Courland the weather has enforced idleness on both armies.

EXCEL AS EGG LAYERS

Guinea Fowls Are Also Superior as Insect Destroyers.

They Range Long Distances From House During Day in Search of Food, But Come Near House to Lay—Flesh Is "Gamey."

 Some people object to the noise which guineas make and their wild nature, but as summer egg-layers guinea hens are hard to beat.

We have three guinea hens and a cock that have the range of the fields, and they are the best insect destroyers that we have on the farm. They have a better reputation with us as insect destroyers than the thieving crow which some writers commend so highly for the bugs and worms they eat, and they also pay a handsome profit in eggs for any grain they may eat.

The guinea hens I speak of lay an egg each day, and they have been laying for nearly three months. They are likely to keep this up for two months yet.


We have a brood of young guineas that are growing nicely—they are a cross between the pearl and the white guinea, and are growing better than we ever got either full-blood to do.

I never liked the idea of crossing breeds, but a cross seems to increase the vitality of the guinea.

Some have trouble finding the guinea nests, but our guineas have never gone far from the house to make their nests. Sometimes they lay in the hen nests in the poultry house.

They range long distances from the house during the day in search of food, but come near the house to lay.

Guineas are marketed at from six to eight months old. Broilers weighing about one pound are in great demand, as their flesh is then tender and somewhat "gamey." Old birds are dry, tough and tasteless. They should be marketed with the feathers on, the same as game. The age of a guinea fowl can be told in the same way as

that of a chicken. If young the breast bone is flexible, the feet soft and tender, with short, sharp claws, and the outer wing feathers have pointed ends. After a bird is fifteen months old the helmet on the head changes from black to a lead color.

MAKING CREAM-COOLING BOX

Where Ice Is Not Available a Serviceable Tank Can Be Arranged Between Pump and Trough.

It is desirable to remove the animal heat from the milk as soon as possible after it is drawn, and ice is usually recommended. On the farm, however, it is often not practicable to store ice, but the same purpose can be served at very little expense, by putting the milk as soon as drawn into a cooling tank. Such a box placed between the pump and the watering troughs so that all the water passes through it, will keep the cream or milk at a low temperature until ready for delivery.

A concrete box can be made on the farm that will serve excellently for this purpose. It should be provided with a cover, and shaded to keep the water cool when the pump is not running. There are also several forms of wooden and galvanized metal tanks for this purpose on the market. Some of these are now insulated and covered so that they retain the low temperature for some time.

MAKING SPOILED HAY USEFUL

When Not Too Badly Injured It Can Be Salted and Fed to Stock—By No Means Burn It.

There will be much spoiled hay this season because of the excessive rains that have interferred with hay harvest. With some farmers it may be a problem what to do with this spoiled hay. By all means do not burn it.

Where it is not so badly spoiled as to be injurious to stock it can be dried well, salted and fed. There is much feeding value in it if stock can be induced to eat it, and what is not eaten can be used as bedding and thus be made into manure.

Rather than burn this hay scatter it over the fields that are to be plowed for corn next spring. In this way the fertilizing value would not be lost.

Store Poultry Implements.

If you are through with your brooders, incubators and other chicken coops, store them in a good, dry place; clean them out thoroughly and then disinfect them, then they will be ready for next season.

Keep Separator Clean.

To keep the separator clean is one of the most important things to do. A separator that is only a little foul will impregnate with bacteria the next milk and cream, usually to their detriment.
