ITALY AT LAST DECLARES WAR AGAINST GERMANY

Paris Admits Bulgars Have Taken All Except One of the Forts at Kavala on Aegean.

Germany and Italy are at last at war. Italy has ended the anomalous situation that has existed for months by declaring that from Monday she considers herself the enemy of her former ally.

Heavy fighting continues between the Entente and Teutonic allies in the Macedonia theatre from the region of Lake Ochrida eastward to Kavala on the Aegean, but with results belated by diverging statements of Berlin and Paris.

Bulgarian Successes.

Berlin reports that Bulgarian forces operating to the west of Lake Ochrida have captured Malik, Albania, and that along the Struma King Ferdinand's men are approaching the mouth of the river. Paris admits the Bulgars have taken all except one of the forts at Kavala, on the Aegean, but says the newly acquired positions have come under the fire of British warships. Paris says also that along the Struma French artillery is bombarding the enemy, while west of the Vardar and near Lake Ostrovo the Serbs have put down vigorous attacks by the Bulgars.

On Western Front.

Despite bad weather there has been considerable fighting and a renewal of mine warfare along the British front in France. London reports the capture of 200 yards of a German trench Saturday night north of Basentin-Le-Petite and a further gain northwest of Ginchy. Berlin says that British attacks Saturday south of Thiepval, northwest of Pozieres and north of Basentin-le-Petite were without success.

Paris records only the repulse of German attacks along the line held by the French. These attacks were especially violent in the Vaux-Chapitre wood of the Verdun sector, in Lorraine and in the Apremont forest.

In Riga Region.

The Russians, for some time inactive in the Riga region, again have started an offensive. However, their efforts to cross the river southeast of Riga and also near Friederichstadt failed, according to Berlin. On the remainder of the Russian front no important fighting has been reported. In the Carpathians, Petrograd chronicles a fresh advance at Koverla Mountain, near the Hungarian border.

In the Caucasus region, Petrograd reports a Russian success over the Turks along the Masladarasi. Hard fighting is in progress near Diarbeka between the Russians and Ottomans.

Infantry fighting on the Isonzo front is at a standstill but the Austrians are heavily bombarding Italian positions along the river and at Vallone. In the Carnic Alps the Ita'ians have taken several Austrian positions and on the Trentino front the Austrians are vigorously shelling the Italians.

Drifting Gradually to War.

Italy and Germany have been drifting steadily toward war. In fact Italy's formal declaration amounts to little more than official recognition of a state of affairs which already existed. The declaration became inevitable when Italy recently sent troops to Saloniki to co-operate in the campaign on the Macedonia front as Germany is directing the opposing forces and has troops on this battle line.

Italy's position has been anomalous since she withdrew from the Triple Alliance and declared war on Austria. Although by this act she arrayed herself against her former allies, Germany and Austria, she remained officially at peace with Germany until yesterday. Germany exerted every effort to induce her to remain neutral, sending to Rome as ambassador Prince Von Buelow, one of the ablest statesmen of Germany.

Held It Off for Time.

The prince for some time averted war between Austria and Italy and when he saw a rupture was inevitable he negotiated a special agreement under which, in case of war between Austria and Italy, Germany and Italy pledged themselves to respect the property and lives of their respective subjects in each others domain. This means for Germany a guarantee of many millions of dollars' worth of property in Italy and for Italy the safety of 20,000 Italian subjects in Germany.

According to unofficial reports Italy's allies were dissatisfied and asked the Italian representatives at the Paris entente conference why their nation was not at war with Germany. Italy already had agreed not to conclude a separate peace and at the time Paris conference sanctioned the plan for a permanent high council of the Entente Powers for future conduct of the war.

SAYS 2,500 CHILDREN WILL BE CRIPPLED

Expert Makes Gloomy Predictions Concerning Infantile Paralysis in New York.

New York, August 25.—While the daily improvement of the infantile paralysis situation has convinced experts that the epidemic is under control, health department bureau heads estimated tonight that the total number of cases would exceed 10,000 before the disease is stamped out. They predicted that 2,500 children would be left so badly crippled that they would have to wear braces and that more than 3,000 others would hover between being perfectly well and being permanently crippled.

The death toll from the epidemic, it was estimated, would be 2,200 to 2,500. There already have been 7,624 cases and 1,784 deaths.

CORAL REEFS.

Nature's Methods in Building These Seashell Monuments.

Coral reefs surround many of the islands in the Pacific. They protect the lowlands from the washing of the waves, and the still waters inclosed by them are the only harbors of refuge for ships. The reefs themselves furnish the greatest peril to navigation, and if there were no inlet through which a vessel could enter their protected circle they would be a danger and nothing else.

But almost every reef has such an inlet. It is a necessary result of the laws under which the forces of nature work. To understand this we must see how these reefs are formed.

Chemically the reef corals are almost pure carbonate of lime, the substance of ordinary limestone and marble. The reef grows as the shell of the oyster or any other shellfish grows. It is itself the common and undivided shell of innumerable polyp, or minute insects, which are being produced and are dying in successive generations.

These tiny beings get all their living from the waters of the sea. It is from this source also that they derive the salts of lime from which they secrete the bony structure that remains after the animal is dead.

The coral polyp cannot live in fresh water. Their food supply is brought to them by the waves and currents of the sea. As a result it is found that directly opposite the mouth of the stream from the island the reef does not grow. There will be the inlet to the inclosed waters.—Los Angeles Times.


BOONE'S PLACE IN HISTORY.

A Figure That Stands For All That Is Typical of Pioneer Days.

Kentucky's rich country had originally been a neutral zone, threaded with Indian trails, a territory where none might dwell, but through which all were at liberty to move in hunt or war. The shade of its forests was so dense, the story of its white settlement so full of tragedy, that it was known as the "dark and bloody ground."

The great character of its pioneer period had been Daniel Boone, whose adventures, had legendary figure for all that is typical in that vanished phase of our national life.

Born in Pennsylvania, he had grown to manhood on the banks of the Yadkin in North Carolina, had built his hut and married early after the fashion of the locality. But he found tilling the ground dull work, and the town called Expeditions into a hunt game or to make salt at the salt licks, where animals and men alike went to satisfy their cravings, only instead his domain more firmly upon him, and when a wandering Indian trader strayed across his pathway and told him of the rich country to the west called Kentucky, which, in the language of the red men, meant "at the head of the river," or "Long river," he gave himself up to it with a fervor that was little short of fanaticism, believing himself "ordained of God to settle the wilderness."—Helen Nikolay, in Century Magazine.



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

NOTICE OF ELECTION

State of South Carolina, County of Laurens.

Whereas, petitions signed by a legal number of the qualified electors and free-holders residing in Fountain Inn school district No. 3B, Laurens county South Carolina asking for an election upon the question of voting an additional 2 mill high school tax upon the property in said school district to be used for school purposes, have been filed with the county board of education, an election is hereby ordered upon said question, said election to be held on the 9th day of September, 1916 at the School House, in said district under the management of the trustees of said school district.

Only such electors as return real or personal property for taxation and who exhibit their tax receipts and registration certificates as required in the general election shall be allowed to vote.

Those favoring the 2 mill additional tax shall vote a ballot containing the word "YES" written or printed thereon. Those against the 2 mill additional high school tax shall vote a ballot containing the word "NO" written or printed thereon. Polls shall open at the hour of 8 o'clock in the forenoon and shall remain open until the hour of 1 o'clock in the afternoon when they shall be closed, and the ballots counted.

The trustees shall report the result of the election to the county auditor and county superintendent of education within ten days thereafter.
