

NOTICE of the COUNTY TREASURER

The Books of the County Treasurer will be opened for the collection of State, County and Commutation Road Taxes for fiscal year, 1915, at the Treasurer's office from October 16th to December 31st, 1916. After December 31st one per cent will be added. After January 31st, two per cent will be added, and after February 28th, seven per cent will be added till the 15th day of March, 1917, when the books will be closed.

All persons owning property in more than one Township are requested to call for receipts in each of the several Townships in which the property is located. This is important, as additional cost and penalty may be attached.

All able-bodied male citizens between the ages of 21 and 60 years of age are liable to pay a poll tax of \$1.00 except old soldiers, who are exempt at 50 years of age. Commutation Road Tax \$1.50 in lieu of road duty.

For Testing Gold.
The acid used by jewelers for testing gold is extremely powerful and has to be very carefully handled. To prevent any considerable quantity of the acid being spilled a specially constructed bottle is employed. The stopper of this is made of glass and contains a long pointed glass rod which passes down the center of the bottle. When an article of jewelry is to be tested the stopper is simply removed, and the article is touched with the point of the glass rod, to which a very slight quantity of acid has adhered. Gold is not affected by the acid, but imitation metal turns green.

CHESTER MAN KILLED ON ATLANTA STREET
John B. Tennant Succumbs to Knife Wound—Body Brought Home for Burial.

Chester, Oct. 20.—John B. Tennant, a wey known young man of the Cornwell section of Chester county but recently working in Atlanta, is dead as the result of having been stabbed with a knife in the left chest in that city by J. J. Burchell, aged 42, early Sunday morning. He is the son of J. M. Tennant, president of the Chester County Rural Free Delivery association. The body arrived in the city at a late hour last night and was met at the Seaboard Air Line Station by the R. F. D. carriers and friends of this city. Mr. Tennant was a highly esteemed young man of only 31 years of age; and possessed many warm friends and relatives in Chester county.

The funeral services were conducted this afternoon at the Pleasant Grove Presbyterian church, by the pastor, the Rev. R. Roy Brown, and the interment was made in the graveyard of the church.

Burchell is now being held in Atlanta, charged with the murder of Tennant.

It is said that an ambulance was called to the corner of Windsor and Orange streets in Atlanta Sunday morning at 2 o'clock, where Mr. Tennant was badly wounded. On reaching a hospital Mr. Tennant told physicians that he and Burchell had had an altercation at the foregoing corner and that he had sustained the wound in the scuffle. Mr. Tennant stated that the altercation was precipitated by his endeavoring to get Burchell to go to his home, a few blocks distant. Mr. Tennant declared that Burchell was very drunk and that was the reason that he was trying to get his friend to go home.

Burchell, on being informed of Tennant's death by an officer, admitted stabbing the dead man, but said that the cutting was unintentional, and that he greatly regrets the death

of Tennant, whom he regarded as a friend. Burchell refused to tell anything of the circumstances which brought about the stabbing.

Mr. Tennant recently went to Atlanta to pursue a course in a tonsorial school. Following his graduation he was quickly given a position with one of that city's leading barber shops, his employer selecting him because he neither smoked nor drank. In his brief stay in that city his popularity grew immensely.

Mr. Tennant's father, J. M. Tennant, went to Atlanta yesterday and accompanied the body to his home in this county. Mr. Tennant was a widower and is survived by a young son, John B. Tennant, Jr.; his father, J. M. Tennant; a brother, James Tennant, and four sisters, Mrs. Irene Tennant, Mrs. Mattie Rains and Misses Sarah and Mary Tennant, all residents of Chester county.
