 Physicians are requested to make propositions on both the visit basis and also on salary basis. Proposition will be considered on either one or both of these institutions. Propositions on the fee basis will state fee for first patient treated on visit and one additional call fee for treatment of all other patients requiring treatment on same visit, but in no case more than one call fee to be charged in addition to visit fee. Propositions on salary basis will name the amount, payable quarterly, at which the medical practice of each of these institutions will be done. In either case the county to furnish necessary medicines except such medicines as are ordinarily carried and administered by physician at time of visit.

TRIBUTE TO DEWEY RECITES HIS MERIT

Tillman, Presenting Resolution, Pays High Honor to Virtues of Admiral.
 Washington, Jan. 18.—Senator B. R. Tillman, chairman of the senate committee on naval affairs, yesterday offered appropriate resolutions on the death of Admiral George Dewey. In stating that the senate had learned with profound grief of the death of Admiral Dewey, who, he said, had served his country brilliantly for more than 62 years, Senator Tillman paid a glowing tribute to his memory, saying: "Our country has lost another great naval hero. George Dewey, admiral of the navy and hero of Manila bay, died last evening at 5:56 o'clock."
 "His spirit was the spirit of John Paul Jones, of Stephen Decatur of Jas. Lawrence of Oliver Hazard Perry of David Farragut. He upheld and illustrated the traditions which these men and others like them established. He knew no fear. His first thought always was the navy and his duty to it, as was his last thought. John Paul Jones, with his ship sinking under him, replied, in answer to a summons to surrender, 'I have not yet begun to fight.' Perry's message, after his famous victory, was 'We have met the enemy and they are ours'; James Lawrence, mortally wounded, shouted with his breath, 'Don't give up the ship'; Farragut, sailing into Mobile bay which was said to be filled with torpedoes, said, 'Damn the torpedoes, go ahead'; and Dewey, entering Manila bay, with nipses and torpedoes under him and shore batteries and enemy ships firing on him, uttered not a word until he gave the famous order, clearly and quietly, as if he were talking of another matter: 'You may fire when you are ready, Gridley.'

"Admiral Dewey was a lineal descendant of the heroes who preceded him. We can not do him too much honor. I ask immediately consideration of the resolution which I send to the desk."
 Upon the adoption of these resolutions the senate immediately adjourned and a special committee of seven members of that body will meet a similar committee from the house to take further action for the funeral Saturday.

Perfectly Cut Diamond.
 A properly cut diamond has 58 facets, including the table and culet; the 32 facets above the girdle should be 40 per cent of the girdle and the angle from the girdle to the table should be 35 degrees and from the girdle to the culet 40 degrees. A perpendicular line drawn from the center of the table to the center of the culet will be one-third above the girdle and two-thirds below.

 Mrs. J. H. Higgs, aged about 74 years, died here on last Wednesday night, Jan. 17, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. G. C. Donnon. Mrs. Higgs was sick with measles only a few days previous to her death. Her body was carried to Friendship church on Thursday for interment, the funeral service being conducted by Rev. J. A. Brock.
 Mrs. Higgs had been a member of the Baptist church since her girlhood days.
 The little child of Mr. and Mrs. Furman Campbell died here of measles this morning and will be buried at Enoree tomorrow.

FAILED TO GIVE ADDRESS.

Pathetic Case of Mother and Daughter Separated for Many Years.

New York, Jan. 17.—In writing a joyous letter to her newly-found daughter after a separation of 19 years, Mrs. Henry Holzhauser forgot to impart one important detail—her address.
 That one omission is keeping the longing pair apart. It imposes an indefinite period of suspense between Mrs. Christine Marski, of 161 Stockholm street, Brooklyn and the fulfillment of her heart's desire.
 Phillip Holzhauser, father of the family, was a farmer on the outskirts of New Brunswick, N. J. Nineteen years ago, after a furious quarrel with his wife, he abandoned the farm and her, taking with him their three sons and the baby, Christine, then 2 years old.
 He brought them to Brooklyn, and established a home at 232 Stanhope street. The children were not happy. Christine told sad stories last night of their father's treatment. Her brothers rebelled one by one, and she ran away at 17. Holzhauser has since disappeared.
 Christine became a maid in the home of Mrs. Johanna Black, 798 Nostrand avenue. To her kind mistress she confided her longing to find her deserted mother, and between them they wrote here and there in an effort to trace her.
 Four years ago the young woman married Adam Marski, and they went to live in Stockholm street. Two children came to them.
 Mrs. Marski still longed for her mother and lost no opportunity of inquiring for her. A year or two ago she was thrown into great excitement by hearing in the neighborhood of the Stanhope street address that Mrs. Holzhauser had been there in search of her lost ones, but she left no address.
 Three weeks ago the daughter thought of a new plan. She wrote to the New Brunswick Home News, explaining the circumstances, inclosing the only picture she possessed of her mother and begging the paper to help her.
 The Home News printed the story and picture on its front page last Saturday, giving Mrs. Marski's address, and Monday the daughter received a letter from her mother.
 It was a tremulous semi-hysterical letter, half in English and half in German. It began:
 "My Darling Daughter: No one can tell how glad I was to hear from you through the paper. I am sick in bed—probably my deathbed. Try and come to see me as soon as possible. Friends are taking care of me."
 And so it rambled on to the signature, "Mother," but with never a sign or shadow of an address.

HUGH S. KENNEDY DIED OF PNEUMONIA MONDAY

Had Been Sick but Several Days, Funeral Yesterday Afternoon.

Hugh S. Kennedy, member of the firm of Kennedy Bros., one of the substantial business men of the city, died at his home on East Main street Monday about noon after a brief illness. His death was due to an attack of pneumonia, which came on so abruptly that most of his friends were not even aware of his sickness when the announcement of his death came.
 The funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at the Laurens cemetery, being largely attended by sorrowful friends and neighbors of the deceased, acted as pall bearers: J. W. Leake, of Clinton, John D. Childress, D. A. Barnett, J. D. Watts, F. P. McGowan, B. F. Posey, N. B. Dial, Lamar Smith and Dr. L. S. Fuller.
 Mr. Kennedy is survived by his wife, who was a Miss Corrie Barksdale, and the following brothers and sisters: J. H. Kennedy, H. B. Kennedy, C. E. and Miss Lillie Kennedy, all of Laurens, and Mr. C. D. Kennedy, of Texas.
 Mr. Kennedy was 59 years of age. He had been in the mercantile business in Laurens since about 1885, having been associated with his brother, Mr. C. E. Kennedy. In all of his business relations he carried an upright and honest that won and held for him the highest respect of those

who knew him. He was a man of strong convictions and had the courage to express them when the public welfare demanded. He was a member of the First Baptist church and was a constant attendant upon its services. In his death the city has lost one of its best citizens.
