the General Statutes Relating to Market. Be it ordained by the mayor and aldermen of the town of Newberry, in council assembled, and by the authority of the same, That Chapter I of the General Ordinances of the said town, relating to market, and ratified June 25th, 1885, be,

ding two other Sections, to be known as

Section XIV and Section XV, which shall read as follows: SECTION XIV. Any butcher who shall sell or expose for sale in the public mar- GRAIN, ket the flesh of any animal that was not slaughtered by himself, or under his supervision, shall, on conviction, be fin- MEATS, ed not more than fifty dollars, or imprisoned not more than twenty days. SECTION XV. It shall be unlawful for FLOURS, any person or persons, not employed at market, nor engaged in marketing, to loaf, loiter or assemble at or about the public market during market hours, and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to sit or engage in playing any game or games on the sidewalk in front of the said public market, or under the market shed in front of the stalls. Any conviction, be fined not more than five
